PARK NEEDS OF CITIES

TOLD BY U. O. LEADER

University of Oregon, Eugene, February 19.—Oregon communities should demand and obtain thoroughly adequate parks and playgrounds that will meet recreational needs and at the same time satisfy the love for civic beauty, it was declared by E. E. DeCou, professor of mathematics at the University of Oregon and a member of the Eugene Park Board, in an address made recently over radio station KOAC. The talk was one of a series on municipal affairs sponsored by the bureau of municipal research of the University of Oregon.

A plea to become more "park-minded" was sounded by the educator in his talk. "In the west, with natural beauty everywhere, it is sometimes hard to understand why money should be spent beautifying parking strips and city parks," he said.
