Nineteen counties of the state were on the right side of the motor vehicle accident ledger at the end of 1935 with decreases in fatalities, reported Earl Snell, secretary of state. Crook, Curry, Harney, Morrow, and Sherman led the list with no deaths from automobile smashes during the year.

Other counties foremost in achievin better records and aiding Oregon in reaching third place on the national honor roll were Columbia, Klamath, Marion, Union and Wasco. all of which showed substantial cuts in fatalities. In contrast, eleven counties showed a greater number of deaths while six counties had unchanged records.


