

19 Oregon Counties Reduce Auto Deaths Says Secy. of State

Nineteen counties of the state were on the right side of the motor vehicle accident ledger at the end of 1935 with decreases in fatalities, reported Earl Snell, secretary of state. Crook, Curry, Harney, Morrow, and Sherman led the list with no deaths from automobile smashes during the year.

Other counties foremost in achieving better records and aiding Oregon in reaching third place on the national honor roll were Columbia, Klamath, Marion, Union and Wasco, all of which showed substantial cuts in fatalities. In contrast, eleven counties showed a greater number of deaths while six counties had unchanged records.

Of the 259 deaths resulting from such causes in the state, 83 occurred in Multnomah county, 59 of which were in the city of Portland. Lane with 19 fatalities, Marion with 17, Clackamas with 16, and Klamath with 14, were next in number of deaths. Of these five counties, all had bettered their 1934 records, with the exception of Lane county, which had one more fatality in 1935 than in the prior year.

In addition to Lane, other counties with increases in deaths were Coos, Deschutes, Gilliam, Grant, Jackson, Lake, Malheur, Tillamook, Wallowa, and Yamhill. Counties that showed no change in the number of fatalities were Baker, Benton, Clatsop, Crook, Jefferson, and Morrow.

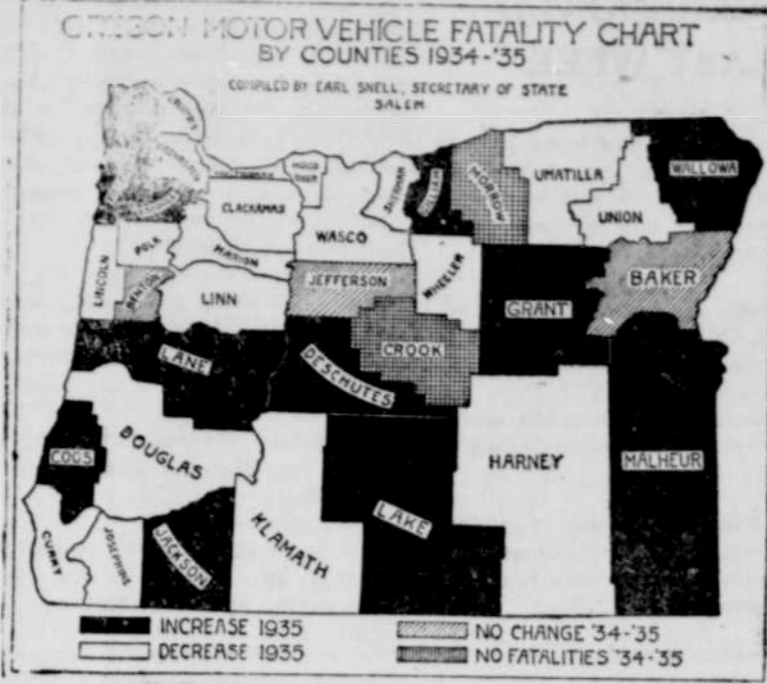

Over 11 Million Still Unemployed Under New Deal

Washington, D. C.—With the Roosevelt administration already having spent more than 18 billions of dollars in its attempt to bribe the bluebird of prosperity into returning, the national debt facing a possible record high of 35 or 40 billions, and promises of budget-balancing farther than ever from fulfillment, 11,401,000 workers, according to William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, are still out of work.

It is estimated that the federal expenditures for the next fiscal year will be at least \$9,750,000,000, by far the largest of all time. This will further extend a series of deficits in the federal budget. The deficit for the current fiscal year, which ends June 30, is estimated at \$3,230,000,000, despite the fact that President Roosevelt in his first budget mes-



sage said that we should plan for a balanced budget in the "third year of recovery," which is the present fiscal year. Now it is likely that the deficit for the fourth "year of recovery" (the 1937 fiscal year) will be \$4,000,000,000 or more. The deficits for 1935 and 1934 were \$3,575,000,000 and \$3,999,000,000, respectively.

Is Conservative Estimate.
This estimate for the 1937 deficit even takes into account the possibility that new taxes will be added to the already heavy tax burden to increase federal receipts. It assumes that the President will find some way of cutting about 25 per cent from the \$2,000,000,000 which Secretary Morgenthau indicated would be necessary for relief. It assumes that only \$1,500,000,000 of the bonus "baby bonds" will be cashed, instead of \$2,000,000,000.

If no new taxes are added, if \$500,000,000 is spent for the new farm plan, \$2,000,000,000 for the bonus and \$2,000,000,000 for relief, the deficit for the fiscal year 1937 would exceed \$5,500,000,000. Expenditures would soar to something like \$10,750,000,000.

A national debt of 35½ billions of dollars, which Secretary Morgenthau has said is entirely possible within the next fiscal year, would mean a debt of approximately \$280 for every man, woman and child in the United States. This debt is a prior lien on everything the citizen owns or earns. It is reflected in taxes on virtually everything he buys—a suit of clothes, a dress for his wife, a loaf of bread (bread, for instance, bears the burden today of no less than 53 different taxes), theater tickets, light, gas, shoes, gasoline and countless other common articles.

Debt Now 30½ Billions
The total federal debt at the end of January was \$30,516,452,985, an increase of more than \$7,000,000,000 over the same date a year before. The combined debt of federal, state and local governments was about \$50,500,000,000, and \$10,500,000,000 in taxes were collected during 1935.

"The rising costs of government are now one-third of the national income," said Harper Sibley, president of the United States Chamber of Commerce. "If all the income of individuals reported for federal tax purposes were to be appropriated to public uses, it would defray the cost of government—federal, state and local—for just thirty-three weeks."

One reason for the continued depression may be seen in the fact that taxes now eat up 20.6 per cent of the national income as compared with only 12 per cent in 1929, when that income was vastly higher.
