

Big Circus Scheduled For Two Performances



The circus! Lions, tigers, clowns, acrobats, peanuts, popcorn, and horses, horses horses.

The Al G. Barnes show, one of the world's largest circuses, will exhibit in Medford on Wednesday, May 6.

Transported aboard special trains with numerous employees, in addition to 108 advance men, an official of the circus here today furnished some statistics. Hundred head of draft horses are carried; and innumerable head of ring stock. There are performers, representing 18 foreign countries. Riders headed by the Cristiani Troupe of seven Italian equestrians will be seen along with Al G. Barnes' 40 dancing horses and 40 dancing girls. The Walters troupe of acrobats, who perform high up in the dome of the "big top" will thrill and amaze in acrobatic work. Acrobats and clowns will also be a part of the super program.

For more than a quarter of a century the Al G. Barnes Circus has excelled with its trained wild animals. More than a score of international wild animal trainers will be seen. Foremost among them will be seen Bert Nelson, who has returned to America after fresh foreign triumph. For this season he is presenting a group of 26 lions and tigers in a display of courage, daring and patience.

Tillie, the fan dancing elephant, has gone high hat this season with her ostrich plumed crown and will have the women ogling her jealousy. Mary Cornell, one of the pretty girls with the circus, has a prominent place on Tillie's howdah, where she may also shine among the plumes.

The "Fiesta of the Rio Grande", a gorgeous professional fiesta with the charm and romance of old Spain a glorious fairland spectacle of pantomime enchantment, will open the circus performance as a prelude. Superb beyond belief, indescribable, a triumph among colossal productions, it is today sweeping all before it with its all-powerful appeal and the very vastness of its character. It is the crowning spectacle in the long, eventful career of Al G. Barnes. One thousand men and women, horses and animals participate in the stupendous spectacle. Great companies of trained singers, orchestras of vast size, grand golden-tongued organs, cymbals and trumpets will be heard. Seventy thousand dollars was expended on wardrobes for this gorgeous prologue pageant.

Performances will be given at 2 and 8 p. m. The doors will open at 1 and 7 p. m. to permit an inspection of the zoological collection or to enjoy a concert of popular and operatic music by Prof. Woekener's military band.

A "Let's Quit Killing" drive got underway in Medford yesterday when the small sedan in which Miss Ruth Riggs was nearly killed, and Ronald Tremaine badly injured when it crashed into a truck driven by Wilbur Lehman, also injuring him was placed on display in front of the chamber of commerce building.

A placard, "Let's Quit Killing," was placed on the wrecked car by A. H. Banwell, manager of the chamber of commerce, who arranged for the display.

Tremaine, at first was hesitant about allowing the car to be placed on display, but when it was explained to him that it might help prevent some other driver from being hurt, he readily agreed.

"It's a horrid thing to have on Main Street," Manager Banwell said, "but if it helps to prevent even one wreck, or if it causes one reckless driver to stop to consider the dangers of speed and carelessness it will be worth while."

City Engineer Fred Scheffel arranged to have the platform built, and the Lewis Super Service sta-

tion brought the wrecked car from the garage.
