Ralph Billings Asks Re-election As Co. Commissioner

To the citizens of Jackson County: As a candidate for nomination as county commissioner on the Republican ticket, and not having the opportunity of personally meeting very many of the voters of this county, on account of my duties as present county commissioner, and spring work to be cared for on my farm, I am presenting the following facts to you for your earnest consideration.

The County Judge, and two commissioners, are the administrators of the business of your county and, to protect your interests, must be men of good character, mature judgment, with good sound business principles, honest, fair and impartial.

The duties required are not light, but require considerable time, careful thought and economical handling to accomplish the results to which you are entitled.

Relief work, including pensions, hospitalization, mothers' aid, handling of the poor farm and assisting those in actual distress, required an expenditure of \$84,904.59, during 1935, and calls for careful, efficient handling to secure the most beneficial results to the greatest number needing assistance, keeping in mind always the ability of the taxpayers in these distressed times to pay the bills.

Jackson County has about 1000 miles of roads and 700 bridges. We are operating this department on about one-third of the average millage cost for the State. In spite of the small budget, we have been able to keep our roads on a par, or better than most of the county roads in the State. We have had to make up in efficiency and careful planning what we have lacked in finances. During the past three years, this road department has been entirely divorced from politics.

The present county court, of which I have been a member for the past

few years, is working very harmoniously, with a sincere regard for the welfare and protection of the taxpayers and citizens of Jackson County. The county's finances have improved from a situation where county 6 per cent warrants were being discounted five to ten percent of their face value, to where the banks are now anxious to cash for full value the 5 percent warrants now being issued.

I feel that my experience of one term as county commissioner has been of great value in acquainting me with the problems that come before the Court. If you feel that I have done my part toward an honest and efficient administration of the county's affairs, I will appreciate your support.
