

### Careless Shots Wound Lad, Peril Central Pt. Trio

Accidental and carelessly fired bullets wounded one youth and menaced three men in Jackson county the past two days.

A stray bullet yesterday afternoon, passed through the windshield of the auto owned by Earl R. Borden narrowly missing J. D. Long and Sam Jacobs, both of Central Point, seated in the front seat and Borden who was standing alongside discussing a hay contract, in the Charles Haas hay field near Central Point.

The bullet passed diagonally thru the windshield, and grazed the window edge. A hurried search brought no trace of the gunner.

Monday afternoon, Edward Scrivner, 17, of Phoenix, and two boy companions were shooting at tin cans, with a .22 calibre rifle. Scrivner was talking, when the lad with the gun turned around to engage in the conversation. The gun was accidentally discharged, the bullet striking Scrivner in the knee-cap, causing the bullet to be diverted to the back of the knee.

Dr. Harold B. Gillis, who attended said the wound was superficial. The bullet was removed and Scrivner will suffer no ill-effects.

The groom has been attending ministerial college near Chicago, Ill., and was ordained in May. The young couple will make their home in Harbel, Ill.

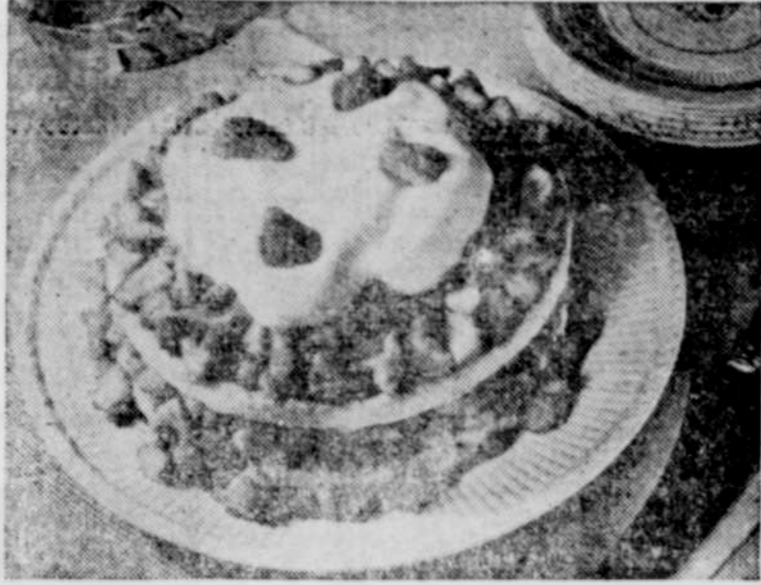
Invitations were issued to a large number of guests for the wedding ceremony.

## Treat Your Family To An Old-Fashioned Shortcake



Strawberry Season Is Too Brief For Lovers of This Delicacy—Make the Most of It.

Strawberry time is shortcake time. The modern woman, wishing to serve a strictly early-American delicacy, should by all means make at least one old-fashioned strawberry shortcake while the berries are in season. It's popular with every member of the family. Such a cake is easy to prepare, decidedly inexpensive — and very luscious. Once tried, it becomes a regular dessert—so long as strawberries can be obtained. Here is a carefully tested recipe.

**Old Fashioned Strawberry Shortcake**  
2 cups flour  
4 teaspoons cream of tartar  
baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons sugar  
4 tablespoons shortening  
1/2 cup milk  
1 quart strawberries, crushed and sweetened

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar; add shortening and mix in thoroughly with fork. Add liquid to make soft dough. Turn out on floured board and toss lightly until outside looks smooth. Divide in half. Shape into 2 rounds to fit a layer cake pan. Place one round in pan. Spread with soft butter. Place other round on top. Bake in moderate oven at 400° F. about 25 minutes. Split while hot and butter. Spread crushed berries between and on top of layers. Serve with or without cream. Serves 8.
