William Harrison Watt, 74, passed away at the family home in the Voorhies district, one half mile south of Medford, Monday at 4:00 p. m., after an illness of the past few weeks.

Mr. Watt was born at Ohioville, Pennsylvania, April 9, 1862. He had been a resident of Jackson county for the past 31 years, being in the orchard business most of the time. He was a fine Christian man, and long time member of the Presbyterian church, in which he held many positions.

Mr. Watt was united in marriage to Jean Donald Young November 23 1925, at Portland, Oregon. She survives him, as do two sisters, Mrs. William McKean of Eonn Valley, Pennsylvania, and Mrs. Lizzie Littall, of Ambridge, Pennsylvania.

Mr. Watt was a member of Medford lodge No. 103, A. F. & A. M., Malta Commandery No. 4, Knights Templar; Hillah Temple of the Shrine, Ashland, Oregon; Reames Chapter, O. E. S., No. 66. He was a member of the school board of district No. 15.
