## EDITORIALS

### AN ANNIVERSARY

It was 19 years ago this year that commercial aviation was born. Therefore, it is interesting to see how rapid the development has been in this field.

Ten years ago, there was no regular commercially-operated air mail and passenger carrying airplane lines. In 1930, airplanes flew 95,000,000 passenger-miles; in 1935 passenger-miles totaled 313,410,560. In 1930, airmail totaled 7,009,009 pounds; in 1935, it was 13,276,923 pounds. In 1930, air express postage was 286,000; in 1935, it was 3,814,000.

Airplanes, 10 years ago, were something new. Public confidence in them had to be created before they would "take." And in these days when many folks advocate governmental operation of everything, it is interesting to look back upon the development of aviation—in private hands.

### THE AMERICAN SYSTEM

The American system, some say, is out of date. Well, let's see. It seems to us that the success of any form of government should be determined upon the basis of whether it supplies its citizens with luxuries as well as necessities of life.

Applying that yardstick, here is what we find: In the United States, there is 1 radio to every six persons in Europe, including talked-of Russia, there is 1 radio to every 17. In the United States there is 1 mile of railroad to each 500 citizens; in Europe, there is 1 mile to each 2,000. The United States has 1 telephone for every 7 persons; Europe has 1 for every 35. The United States has 1 automobile for every 5 persons; Europe has 1 for every 59. Ten out of each 50 Americans use electric lights; 10 out of every 75 Europeans are electric light customers. In the

United States, life insurance averages \$864 a person; in Europe it averages \$69 a person.

### MACHINES AND THE WORKER

For the short-sighted who think machines rob men of jobs, these facts by W. J. Cameron, of the Ford Motor Company, should be enlightening:

"One year when the (Ford) company spent \$4,000,000 for machinery, its employees increased by 20,000 men, and the payroll by \$48,000,000. Another year when the company spent \$9,000,000 for machinery, its employees increased by 40,000 men and its payroll by \$88,000,000. In another year, when the company invested \$10,000,000 in machinery, employment increased by 37,000 men and the payroll by \$76,000,000.

"That was the invariable experience—the more machinery, the more men."

### EMPLOYEE COERCION

Charges are made these days about employers attempting to coerce their employees against joining labor unions. Isolated cases are carefully selected to prove through fallacious arguments that there is a general tendency in that direction.

But those who wonder about attempts to coerce employees into joining labor unions can't even get their case before the public eye. How many thousands of instances could be found where workers were coerced by threats, direct and implied, into joining unions that actually exist only for the benefit of the organizers?

Of the general tendency, the Los Angeles Times had this to say in connection with the Supreme Court's invalidation of the Guffey Act:

"It is a victory for free labor and a solar-plexus blow to the effort to compel all workers to pay dues and homage to the American Federation of Labor and all employers to bow to the will of William Green."
