The Rev. Weston F. Shields of 835 West Second street, pastor emeritus of the First Presbyterian church, died at 10:10 Monday morning in a Medford hospital in which he has been confined since May 17. He was 78 years old.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Emma Leard Shields, and two sisters, Mrs. D. S. Marshall of Livermore, Pa., and Mrs. Horace Hays of Derry, Pa.

Funeral services were conducted at the Presbyterian church at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Perle chapel was in charge.

Dr. Drummond to Resume Work Soon

Dr. C. I. Drummond will be back on duty as Jackson county physician July 15, according to announcement made this week by Miss Mildred Carlton, president of the Jackson County Public Health association, who also revealed additional news from Harvard university, where Dr. Drummond has been studying during the past school year.

When Dr. Drummond left Medford last September 1, his position as county physician was filled by Dr. A. N. Johnson, who recently left for Lane County to accept a permanent position in public health work. Since his departure Dr. H. B. Gillis has been acting as county physician.
