Old Paper of Boom Days Is Very Interesting

We are in receipt of a copy of the Central Point Globe, published in July, 1916 with the name of Lynn Purdin, editor and publisher. The paper was handed to us by L. Hatfield, who ran across the paper while cleaning out some old papers in his store recently.

The old paper contains the advertisements of many old-time firms whose names will be remembered by older residents. Some of these men are now in business in Medford, some are dead and some have moved from the valley. Among the names noted are Moon Lumber Co., now located at Ashland; Wm. Hammett, plumbing, now in Medford; N. E. Childers, contractor, now in Medford.

One interesting ad was that of Tex and Scott, electrical contractors. Both men are still residents of the city, but neither are in that business now, although Mr. Scott is an employe of Copco. We also note that H. Warner & Son once sold hardware here. The father has passed away but the son is still doing sheet metal work and plumbing here. Miss Mary A. Mee long since sold her drug business and at present assists Mr. E. P. Stone in his store. In an article on the back page we note that a big deposit of gold had been discovered on Bear Creek just north of town. Wonder how much was actually taken out. And we note with interest that even in those days Central Point printers were being accused of being rate-cutters by the august Mail Tribune. That sounds like more modern times.

We also notice that Ferguson & Murray were doing a good livery business on Front street and that John E. Ross ran a confectionery and soft drink establishment. The whole paper is very interesting to us and more so as we used to work with Lynn Purdin in the old days. The last time we saw him was in Marshfield in about 1918.
