William Henry Day, prominent citizen of Ashland and an active participant in Masonic affairs in southern Oregon for the past 29 years, passed away Sunday evening at 7:45 o'clock at his Ashland home. He had been in ill health for several months. Mrs. Day and a nephew residing in Berkeley, California survive him.

PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—Oregon lost one of its best-known pioneers last night with the death of Mrs. Harriet McArthur, 85, the daughter of a former United States senator and mother of a congressman.

AMENDMENT LIMITING AND REDUCING PERMISSIBLE TAXES ON TANGIBLE PROPERTY—Purpose: Constitutional amendment to limit and reduce the total permissible state tax on real and tangible personal property payable in 1937, to 6 mills annually for assessed and equalized valuation thereof, reducing such limit 4 per cent annually to 4.8 mills in 1942 and thereafter; limiting county, district, port and political subdivision levies to same total millage payable annually to 80 and reducing such limit 4 per cent thereof annually to 80 and thereafter.
