

Railroad Expects Big Tourist Year

The Pacific Northwest can look forward to one of the biggest tourist seasons in its history this summer in the opinion of J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent of the So. Pacific Company, Portland.

Ormandy bases his prediction on the increased number and size of special tour parties booked over the Shasta Route by eastern tour agencies; the unusually heavy reservations now being made daily at the Portland reservation bureau and the fact that advance reservations at Crater Lake and Rainier National Parks and other resorts are running well ahead of 1936—itsself a banner year.

Ormandy also pointed out that railtravel from the Middle West and East to the Pacific Coast via the Pacific Northwest has shown a decided increase during the past few years.

Westbound through travel via the Portland gateway in 1935 increased 22 per cent over 1934, Ormandy said. In 1936 there was a gain of 44 per cent over 1935. Prospects point to a substantial increase this year over 1936.
