

Thomas Installs Modern Fixtures

The latest system of accounting and modern bank pay windows have been installed to speed up service to the customer by the Oregon and Washington Mortgage Co., Inc., located in the Craterian building on South Central, according to W. E. Thomas, manager.

Auto refinancing took \$2889, fuel \$380, business \$1658, clothes \$1663, home improvements \$350, legal \$176 personal debts \$291 insurance \$1085, contract refinancing \$1609, taxes \$200, moving \$12, aid friends \$255, department stores \$1472, public utilities \$457, car repairing \$385, jewelers \$599, gas and oil \$39, mortgage interest \$22, real estate \$300, funerals \$800, and travel \$245, according to Mr. Thomas.

Boy Scouts Having Glorious Time on Eastern Pilgrimage

June 24th, 1937
We traveled on the Denver, Rio Grande Western railroad last night from Salt Lake City to Denver Colorado. We arrived at Denver in the evening. During the day we went through the Tennessee Pass, where the highest railroad post office in the United States is located. The elevation is 10,250 feet. We saw Pike's Peak during the day's ride.

In the afternoon we stopped at the Royal Gorge. Many of the Scouts took pictures of the beautiful scenery. A suspension bridge is located high above the Gorge on the top of the cliffs. The bridge is officially recognized as the highest suspension bridge in the United States. It is 1,952 feet high.

When we arrived in Denver we were met by the Scout Executive and two of the field executives and also two Boy Scouts. Transportation was arranged by the Denver Council and they took us to Elitch's amusement park. All the boys enjoyed themselves very much while they attended the concessions and the various side shows. We left Denver in the evening for St. Louis.

June 25th, 1937
In the morning many of the boys did their washing, socks, etc. We stopped for fortyfive minutes at the State capital, Lincoln, Nebraska. We marched around the depot and practised our various drills. On the way to Omaha we saw one of the Burlington Zephyrs speed past. All you could see was a silver streak. At Omaha we visited both depots and saw a portion of the manufacturing and downtown districts.

At 6:00 p. m. the same Friday, June 25th, we entered St. Joseph, Missouri, for a short stop. While we were there we saw the house in which Jesse James was killed.

June 26th, 1937
After an all night sleep in our Pullman we arose in time to leave the train at 7:15 a. m. The St. Louis Y.M.C.A. extended to us the large new swimming pool and facilities without charge and we all enjoyed a swell swim. While in the large St.

Louis depot we saw the Burlington streamliner "Abraham Lincoln." At 10:00 a. m. we entrained for Washington, D. C. in our special air conditioned deluxe coach. Then we crossed the Mississippi River and entered Illinois. After passing through the state we crossed the Wabash River and entered Indiana. We stopped at Vincennes where the George Rogers Clark expedition started.

The ten states that we have gone through in order are California, Nevada, Utah, Colorado Nebraska Kansas, Iowa, Missouri, Illinois, and Indiana.
