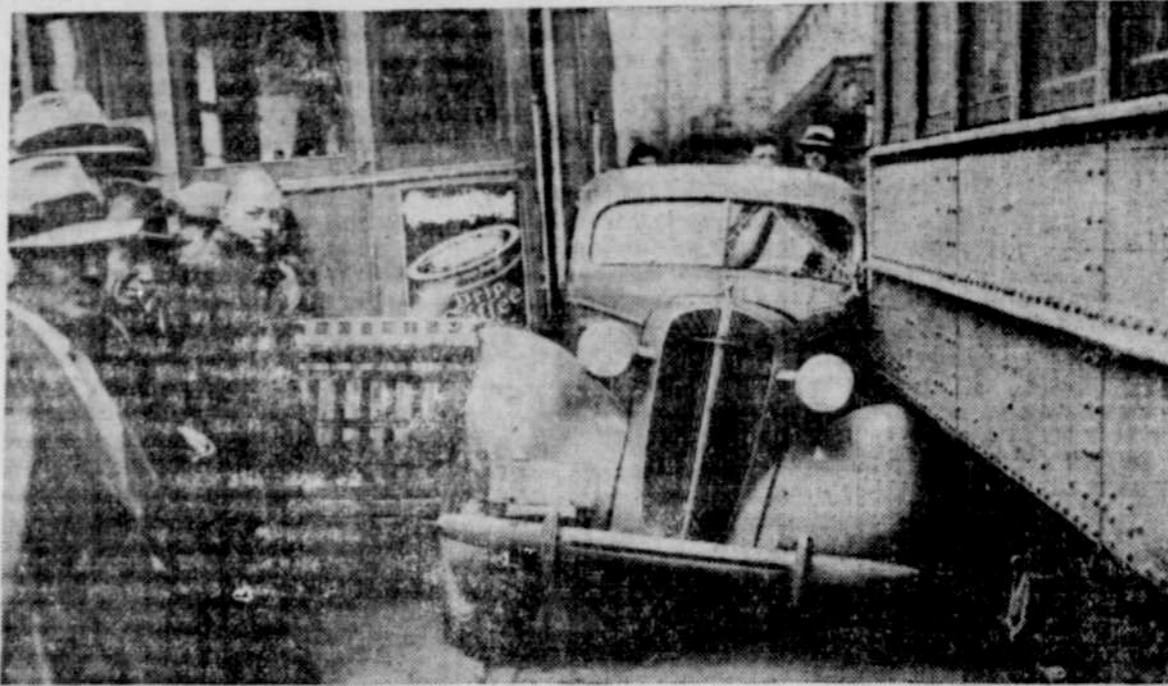

### Students Express Views on Local Traffic Problems

#### EDITORIAL

Although no serious accidents have recently occurred on the old highway, it is not due to the practice of safety first rules by the students of the grades or high school. Every morning, noon, or evening, groups of students forming a line extending well out into the street may be seen walking up or down the highway, sometimes on the proper side of the street but often on the wrong. Also, there are a considerable number of students who drive in a haphazard manner, thus endangering the lives of even the most careful observers of traffic rules.

Sooner or later, if this condition continues to exist, an accident will inevitable occur. It may mean that a person may be only slightly injured but on the other hand he may be seriously hurt or even killed. No accident has occurred yet.

please play safe and cooperate in avoiding a future accident by walking on the side walk or well off the pavement, or by driving your car in such a manner that you would not be alarmed if you saw a state policeman just behind you.—Marjorie Dodson.

#### SAFETY FIRST

Does someone have to get killed before the students will wake up and realize the danger of walking six abreast down the highway? Last week there occurred an accident, that might have been very serious. A small boy was run over by a bicycle. This might easily have been a car that hit the boy, due to the heavy traffic at noon.

The grade school pupils see the high school students walking in this dangerous manner and it seems only right to them that they should follow the example set before them.

As high school students who understand the danger of disobeying this traffic law, let's cooperate and walk on the left side of the highway. Also let's cut down the groups to not more than two abreast.—Letha Hesselgrave.

#### SAFETY FIRST

It has been observed that the pupils of the Central Point schools use the old Pacific Highway for a side walk. It has been pointed out that since the new Pacific Highway has been put into use the old strip of pavement between Central Point and Medford is still under state supervision. Therefore people must observe the traffic laws for pedestrians and walk on it just the same as when walking on any other State Highways.

Pupils must walk on the left side of the road and must not be more than two abreast. When a car is trying to get by, walk close to the edge of the pavement so that the driver doesn't have to dodge all over the road to avoid hitting someone.

So from now on there will be a traffic officer on the road to see that no one will be hurt and that the pupils keep on their side of the road. This may keep you from getting killed or crippled for life. It will also help the driver.—Stanley Jones.

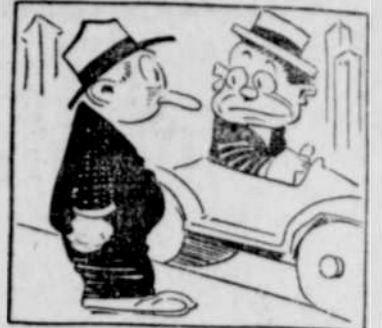
