EDITORIALS

CIVIC MUSIC

With the organization this week of the Southern Oregon Civic Music association our people will once more have an opportunity to hear really great musical concerts. Time was that all, or nearly all, concert companies and artists visiting the coast stopped off in Southern Oregon for one-night stands on account of the long jump from San Francisco to Portland with Medford about half way. Modern transportation facilities and the changing of the railroad main line east of the Cascades has brought an end to all this.

But the Civic Music association is being formed to fill this gap. We feel it is a most worthy project and hope that as many as can will join. Only members of the association will be allowed to attend the concerts. Those who join will receive lasting benefits because, first, you will hear concerts by world famous artists, in your own community; second, because it is economical, cooperative and a splendid civic gesture; and third, because it makes music a permanent, integral part of your civic life.

BY "IFFY THE DOPESTER"

From the Detroit Free Press As between Henry Ford and John L. Lewis the average man in the street can ask himself one question: Which one of them has best served his fellow man? How much work and wealth has Ford created for the people and how much has Lewis provided? Also: Who did more to increase workers' wages, Ford or Lewis? Which one has done the most to raise the standard of American living? Which one is least ambitious for personal political power? When the history of this period is written in the centuries to come which one will loom larger as the benefactor of mankind? Both of them were born on the farm, neither with any advantage over the other. If only one of them could have lived, which would have been the greater loss to the world?

THE HIGH COST OF LIVING

Writing in the New Republic, Jonathon Mitchell observes: "Except for war and peace, the High Cost of Living is now perhaps the liveliest issue before the country." To anyone who has watched legislative developments during the past two or three years, the present situation is not surprising. About forty states have passed laws permitting price-fixing of trade-marked products by manufacturers. The Federal government has approved this policy through the Miller-Tydings Act. Also the Federal government, through the Robinson-Patman Act, has outlawed various established merchandising and distribution practices which tended to reduce overhead and the cost spread between producer and consumer. In other words, we have steadily jacked up prices by law, until they are becoming clear out of line with the earnings of the people. No wonder the High Cost of Living has jumped to the front rank of public problems.
