Information Given Regarding Census Of Unemployed

of Columbia, and the Territories of Hawaii and Alaska. Only one card will be left at each dwelling unless the carrier has reason to believe that there are two or more unemployed workers. Additional cards will be available at any post office or can be obtained upon request from any carrier. All post-office employees will endeavor to answer inquiries concerning the census and the report card and will, upon request, give assistance in filling out the report card or refer the person making the inquiry to the nearest post office.

The confidential nature of the answers to questions on the Unemployment Report Card will be respected by the Administrator of the National Unemployment Census. The names of signers will not be published or made public in any manner.

The President has stated in his message to every worker: "If you

give me the facts, I shall try to use them for the benefit of all who need and want work and do not have it." Registration on the Unemployment Report Card is in no sense registration for a job. Individual jobs will not be provided in this way. The Congress directed that the census be taken to provide information to aid in the formulation of a program for

Who Should Register

Each person in every family should fill out and return an individual Unemployment Report Card to the post office if he is included in any of the groups described in the following paragraph entitled, "Persons Who Should Register." An adequate supply of cards should be made available upon request, in order to assure the inclusion in the census of each person who should register.

a. All persons who are totally unemployed, able to work, and want work. b. All persons who are partly employed, able to do more work, and want more work. c. All persons working full time or part time on projects of WPA, NYA, CCC, or other emergency work projects which are supported by public funds.

Persons Who Should NOT Register

The following groups of employed persons should NOT fill out and return Unemployment Report Cards:

1. Persons who are working full time for wages or commissions, or persons who devote full time to their own business, farm, or professional practice. Note that some of these workers may be looking for another job, but they should not register.
2. Persons who are working part time (except on emergency work projects which are supported by public funds) and who do not want more work.
3. Persons who are on strike unless actively seeking another job.
4. Persons who are temporarily sick or disabled but have a full time job to which they will return as soon as they get well.
5. Persons who are on vacation or are taking time off from a job to which they will return.
6. Administrative employees of WPA, NYA, CCC, or other agencies which are conducting emergency work projects which are supported by public funds.

b. Other groups specifically excluded from registration are:

1. Persons who are unable to

work because of permanent disability or chronic illness.
2. Persons who have retired or who do not want work.
3. Young persons excluded from work because of State child labor laws or local ordinances.

Prizes Given 4-H Boys For Corn

Three hundred and seventy-five ears of selected 4-H club seed corn were on exhibition in Medford last week, the result of a new corn improvement contest started in Jackson county this year and sponsored by the Medford branch of the U. S. National bank. More than 35 acres of corn were planted and cared for by the 16 club boys this year and the acreage is expected to double that amount next year, according to C. D. Conrad, county club agent.

Dr. E. R. Fore, corn breeder at Oregon State college, judged the exhibit and complimented the boys on their good work this year, but pointed out several places where the boys could make some good improvements on their corn and consented to cooperate with the bank and the club members in securing the best seed available for next year. There is a possibility of proven, high-bred seed corn being used for the contest next time. The boys' exhibits consisted of 25 ears of corn and the prizes furnished by the bank were awarded as follows:

2. \$5.00 to Gordon Stanley, Lake Creek.
3. \$3.00 to Benton Walch, Route 3, Medford.
4. \$2.00 to Bob Walch, Route 3, Medford.
5. \$1.00 to Norman Smith, Central Point.
6. \$1.00 to Clayton Charley, Brownsboro, Ore.
7. \$1.00 to Merton Bradshaw, Brownsboro, Ore.
