Sidelights on European Trip Of Goldsberrys

One group of thirty or forty men were dragging a crude sort of float, gaudily decorated in tinsel and paper ornaments, on a high throne like seat were two Priests, with their richly ornamented robes, in all it must have been about thirty feet long and twenty feet high, and its crude home made wheels seemed to have little sense of direction.

Later in the day we met friends from the boat and joined them in a car ride around town and along the beautiful ocean drive where large steamers and native junkies added much to the picture.

Soon after lunch we started for Kanby, 72 miles north, a beautiful very primitive town, nestling deep in the mountains, however it was the intervening country that made this trip one of the high spots of our tour. Try to visualize, coconut palms (the most graceful trees I have ever seen,) 60 or 80 feet high, Jack fruit trees, rubber plantations, poncianna trees, about the size of our oak, with large clusters of a deep pink flowers, changing them to balls of burning embers, and nestling in this landscape the native huts with their dohy walls, thatched roofs and dirt floors; here and there an elephant, perhaps laying flat in a stream with the natives (brush or broom in hand) giving him his bath and to all this add the natives with their gaily colored dress of pink, green and yellow, some in bullock carts, some in car or buss but mostly on foot in groups of four or more and you have the picture we saw on this trip and one we will never forget.

We arrived in Kandy about 4 p.m. and first visited its famous tropical gardens with all its strange shrubs and tropical plants, then a drive along the Queen's road, circling the mountain side, to the temple of the tooth, then around a very beautiful lake to our hotel overlooking the lake. They were celebrating their new year and we could see the fireworks in the distance. When returning to Colombo the following day the natives were returning from worship, the day before and we had the same scene of the previous day only with more color because there are more natives.

We sailed on the Rancho of the P. & O. line for Bombay and I will be meeting you there.
