Is The Closing Date

- Oregon has a system of permanent registration. Once registered the voter need not register again unless he has failed to vote in any election in two years up to and including the general election of 1936, or unless he has, since registering, moved to another precinct.
- Persons who, in the period between close of registration books and day of election, will attain voting age or complete the six months' residence requirement for newcomers, are entitled to register on or before October 8.
