Tuberculosis Cottage To Health Assn.

Certificate of title to a portable tuberculosis cottage was delivered recently to the Jackson County Public Health association by Commissioner Ralph Billings.

The cottage, built at a cost of \$500, was a gift to the association by G. S. Butler, Ashland resident who for several years has aided financially in the cure, prevention and control of tuberculosis.

The new cottage will be used in the Ashland district. It is known as a Burr cottage, used at the home of patients who cannot arrange immediately to enter a sanatorium. Use of the cottage isolates the tubercular patient and permits more readily of scientific treatment.
