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Old Tombstone Found in Shop Puzzles Finders

Recently when a velley paper staff was moving their plant into new quarters they were mystified to discover that one of the printer's stones was a grave yard headstone. The stone had been used in years past as a printer's stone, serving as the top of the bench where printing forms and advertising copy are made up before going on the press. This is evidenced by ink smudges and worn places on the back.

The stone was found under a counter that had not been moved in a decade and was thought at first to be another print shop relic that had been replaced by modern steel top tables. In the moving however, the lettering on the face came to light.

Owners and publishers of the paper as well as the other members of the newspaper staff have made a thorough search for any information that might indicate the origin of the stone or tell something of the stone's history. So far, however their efforts have failed and the news staff is still "mystified".

The stone was inscribed:

MARGARET
wife of
SAMUEL H. HOLT
DIED

Oct. 3, 1883

Aged 32 years

1 mo. and 4 d's

At the top a hand was carved, pointing upward to a star.
