Most men need their meals planned for them too. With their insatiable desire for meat, gravy, and potatoes, and almost universal leanings toward chocolate cake and apple pie for dessert, they would leave little room for fresh fruits and vegetables which, with milk and eggs, are essential in every person's diet. Men usually like milk to drink, so don't forget to serve your husband as well as the children and yourself.

If the men in your household think salads are sissy... and some of them we admit are... break them in easy to their endless glories. They couldn't refuse a chicken or tuna fish salad, and there surely is nothing effeminate about a tasty macaroni salad. After a while you

will have them eating fruit and gelatin salads right out of your hand and asking for more.

Don't ever be guilty of serving limp salads. They must stand on their own two feet and fairly shout their freshness. The lettuce, or whatever other greens you use, must be crisp or you waste your time with salad concoctions. Thousands Die From Lack of Medical Care

Urging a radical change in present Medical Methods, Mr. J. A. Hendrickson of Logan, Utah, gives us the true but startling figures. 14,000 women die annually in pregnancy and from child birth. 79,000 infants die during the first month of their lives. 200,000 die yearly from pneumonia, diabetes, tuberculosis and cancer. A large number of the above fatalities could be avoided if persons needing medical care had the money with which to obtain it. He says that the Townsend Plan by placing money in the hands of our old people and by spreading prosperity to thousands of others would relieve this tragic situation existing today. Thousands of our younger people as well as the older are walking the streets today with teeth that need immediate attention, with eyes that should be fitted to glasses with other ailments that bring on general debility and death and tend further to

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weaken the manhood and womanhood of our entire nation, not only those NOW LIVING but those yet UNBORN. This opposition to the Townsend Plan is beyond the understanding of the writer. The transaction tax cannot fail to put into the hands of our older people, CASH with which to buy the many things they need. FIRST MEDICAL CARE. Then clothes, bedding, furniture, washing machines, gas and electric stoves, radios, even automobiles. House repairs, painting, building, remodeling, new fences, farm machinery and even cows and horses. The merchant's shelves would be swept clean. New merchandising and material rushed in to fill in the depleted stocks. Thousands of young men and men under sixty would be demanded to return to useful occupations to MAKE and care for this demand. They with their salary checks would immediately begin to buy and pay their transactions tax and still more help would be required to take care of this additional demand for goods. And yet some cannot see the practicability of the Townsend Plan. But the answer in many cases is there are "none so blind as those who will not see."
