In only a few weeks the school kids will be walking by the shop on the way to school and we will all be busy in our shop as in the past, printing school papers and such. I will be busy writing sport news of the school. My, it was only a few months ago that school closed for the summer vacation, but it looks like only a few days to me.

By the way Mr. H. P. Jewett has been very busy during the summer on the plan to erect the new gym for the high school. The district is to furnish the material for the building and the WPA will do the erecting. In the last few years it has been noted that the present gym is entirely too small for the fast growing school enrollment. I think that Mr. Jewett and the school board have made a very wise move in deciding to build a new gym for the school. Of course the matter has not been settled yet, as the final decision is in the hands of the WPA officials. But at the latest report is said to be very favorable. There is one thing that I would like to see started. That is if and when the new gym is completed, I would like to see it dedicated as "Jewett Gym."

I don't think that one of the salmon that spawn up around the valley here ever lived to get back to the ocean. That is one of the Nature's biggest reasons that whenever the salmon spawn, they spawn millions of eggs more than there are of the salmon spawning, to make up for the death of the salmon.

Steelhead fishing is just picking up pretty good in the last few days as the cool nights of late has cooled the river considerably. I have hooked half a dozen steelheads in the last four days and got two. One of the steelhead weighed 5 lbs. and 12 ounces dressed. If I had known the rules of the steelhead contest, I would not have dressed the fish at all and probably would have been at the top of the contest list. But I am not worrying yet for I expect to get a bigger one and will give the other fishermen a good contest.

I am getting tired of hooking chinook salmon on flies nowadays. I have hooked three salmon on flies in the last four days. They weighed at least 30 pounds and I have a heck of a time worrying over my pole more than I worry over the fish. But I might lose the fish. But I landed all of them and put them back in the river. But it's lot of fun anyway.

WRESTLING NEWS

Expensive Trout Widely Planted; Where Are They?

What becomes the trout that are planted in Oregon streams and lakes?

During the last two years the Oregon game commission had a gross income of \$1,043,243.95. Persons who bought fishing and hunting licenses paid \$983,960.73 of that amount. Last year 111,873 persons bought fishing licenses.

The commission has fish hatcheries scattered throughout the state. It reports the liberation of 29,586, 131 game fish during the last biennium and of having kept on hand 17,790,641 more.

If these 45,000,000 fish, approximately, lived and were caught by approximately 112,000 licensed anglers it would mean an average of some 400 fish to the fisherman. Without taking natural reproduction into account.

Making of tall fish stories! The facts are, however, that anglers who hope for even fair catches must go far into little penetrated districts or high upon head-water streams. They must go, not where trout are planted, but where natural propagation rules.

The exceptions to this statement apply to some of the lakes.

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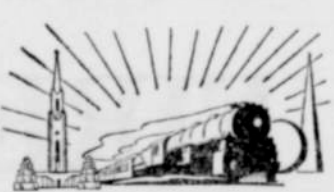
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
