Townsend Club To Present Pictures Thursday Evening

On Thursday January 25, there will be visual educational pictures at the Townsend hall in Central Point, especially for the businessmen and women. We would like to have you all out to see and hear. Just why the Business men of this community don't take more interest in the plan, we can't understand as it will be of more benefit to them than anyone else.

Supposing all the people now drawing pensions were getting \$50 per month, that would increase their buying power threefold, on an average. Having to spend that \$50.00 where would they spend it if not the stores. They would have to relinquish their jobs if they had any, thus giving work to the younger persons which in turn would have a purchasing power in proportion to the work relinquished by the elders.

Had the Townsend plan become a law one year ago, you would not see a bunch of fine looking young men, full of pep, standing on the street corners talking. Of what? Nothing of importance as there are no events happening to them to talk about. They would all be out on a job, and when pay day come around they too would go to town to spend their wages for goods, or payments on homes. Now for some of the things the Townsend plan will do. It will put people to work and by so doing will reduce our crime at least 50 per cent. According to J. Edgar Hoover Crime costs the people of The United States around \$17,000,000,000 annually. It will reduce the inmates of our reform schools 75 per cent. It will reduce the inmates of our insane asylums. It will do away with the WPA, PWA, CCC and all the relief projects and reduce divorces, and suicides, which mostly are buried by the county. All this expense, my friends, is paid by direct tax on property, while the cash raised by the Townsend plan will come mostly from a 2 per cent tax on new business created by the forced spending of the pensions. Every body come out and if any one wants to ask questions, there will be someone to answer them.

Both of our honorable Senators are Townsendites. So are our three congressmen. Washington state has only one National representative that isn't a Townsendite. California only lacks three, and they will be replaced as fast as they came up for election. Ohio has Robert Taft, son of ex-President Taft that stands square for the Townsend plan. Ohio, Penn., Illinois, North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and Arkansas are as good as in the bag. With a number of other states on their way, The Townsend Plan can win and The Townsend Plan will win.
