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Plea Made for Additional Funds For Finnish Relief

"It is desired to remind the public of the Finnish Relief Fund which is being raised in the United States under the direction of Ex-President Herbert Hoover. It is for humanitarian relief; not military purposes," stated W. H. Paine, chairman of the Jackson County Finnish Relief Fund, this week.

There is general admiration for the very gallant and highly efficient stand which the Finns are making against enormous odds. Appalling is the magnitude of the devastation and distress which are being inflicted upon their people by methods of warfare which spare neither infancy nor old age, and make no distinction of sex.

Mr. Hoover says "Finland is not a rich country. The people have little reserve for emergency. Air attacks have compelled the evacuation of civilians from their towns and cities. Hundreds of thousands of women and children have been driven from their homes in the middle of northern winter. Many are already, and more will be, refugees outside their own country. Many are destitute. Others are without adequate shelter, clothing and food."

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What becomes of money contributed? The whole of what is received in Jackson County is sent directly to the Chase National Bank of New York City. Information received from Oregon State Headquarters for this fund states explicitly that one hundred cents of every dollar collected is turned over for Finnish Relief. All expense of administration is being borne by subscriptions for that purpose.

It is hoped that everyone who can afford it, and has not already done so, will visit one of the above listed collectors and put sympathy for the Finns into the form of practical help for them.

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
