Story of Journey

Through Orient

This was one one of the finest trains we had ever been on in a foreign country, here we stayed at the Wagon Lit Hotel where the food and service were all that one could wish for.

The next day we bargained for two rick-shaws and started to see the sights and sights they were indeed, the forbidden city with some of the most unusual exhibits of Chinese exhibits of Chinese art dating back for thousands of years, buddhas as tall

as a three story buildings, then there was the Temple of Heaven, New Year Temple, the Altar of Heaven, the Temple of Agriculture, the first three of which were very fine indeed and while old were in splendid state of preservation. We return through the public park and then to the rug factory, where several rugs were in the making. The carding and dyeing of the wools are done by very small boys of not more than five or six years and at seven or eight they are often working at the looms which of course are all hand work and their fingers literally fly as they knot and clip knot and clip, working out the design on the chart nearby.

June 15th we take a train out some twenty five or thirty miles where we hike an additional two or three miles to the great wall and climb along its broad top of about fifteen or twenty feet as it climbs up the hill and we marvel at its wonderful state of preservation and think of the suffering and death during its construction.

Returning, we leave the train at a station across town from our hotel and by rick-a-shaw go to the Bell Tower, the Drum Tower, the Hall of Confucius, the Hall of Classics and the Lama Temple, all very historical and interesting but to describe them is beyond the power of my pen.

Council Considers

Tearing Down of Old Buildings

wages, even though the job called for much less physical labor than the old one had done. He said he had never had a desire to work any hard-ship on Mr. Hedgpath nor to force him off the job, so when the council met he changed the plan and proposed that Mr. Ford be placed in charge of both the water and street departments and that Mr. Hedgpath be retained as city marshal and general utility man to take care of all odd jobs other than street and water work. The council had voted unanimously to adopt this plan at their adjourned meeting in January, the mayor stated.

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After some discussion, a vote was taken upon the adoption of the above plan of placing Mr. Ford in charge of all city work at a salary of \$100 per month and hiring a city marshal at a salary of \$50 per month. This plan was adopted by a vote of four to one, Councilman Glass being out of the city.

The mayor then asked whether the council wanted him to make the appointment of the new city marshal at that time, saying that several applications had been received for the combined job of city marshal and assistant to Mr. Ford, but none for the marshal's job alone. Upon motion of Councilman Scott, the council decided to ask for the appointment at once, Mayor Powell stated that when the plan which had just been adopted was first considered back in January he had asked one man if he would accept the job at \$50 per month and he had said he would, so he offered the name of C. H. Mosher to be city marshal for the coming year, with the understanding, however, that the appointment was to be on a month-to-month basis and if the plan should prove unsatisfactory, it might be changed at any time. The council voted unanimously to endorse the appointment of Mr. Mosher.

At a special meeting of the city council held last night at the home of Mayor Powell the matter of the purchase of the old Theiss building was discussed. Mrs. E. C. Simmons, the owner, made a very attractive offer to sell the building to the city on a ten-year contract with the idea that the building might be remodeled as a community hall. However, the majority of the councilmen present felt that it was unwise to undertake such a project at this time on account of limited finances and the fact that no such project had been provided in the budget.

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
