EDITORIALS

"MICROSCOPIC" BILLIONS

It was recently stated that the total indebtedness of Federal, State and local governments did not increase during the seven-year period from 1932 to 1939. In that period, according to this statement, the Federal debt increased "somewhat" but was offset by a corresponding falling off in the debt of states, cities and political subdivisions. In other words the public is supposed to believe that the public debt, on the whole, is no larger now than a few years ago, when a billion dollars looked like a lot of money even to a congressman. The exact figures, as published in the Annalist and compiled by the National Industrial Conference Board, tell a vastly different story. Says the Annalist: "In the seven years ended June 30, 1939, the Federal gross debt (not counting the government-guaranteed debt, which on June 30, 1939, amounted to \$5,469,591,592) increased SOMEWHAT from \$19,487,009,766 to \$40,439,532,411. Total State and local debts in the meantime DECREASED from \$19,330,000,000 to \$19,626,000,000, so that the total indebtedness of the Federal, State and local governments REMAINED PRACTICALLY UNCHANGED having shown the negligible, microscopic, infinitesimal increase of \$21,249,000,000 from \$38,817,000,000 to \$60,066,000,000."

If the increase in the Federal debt had been offset, as reported, by a corresponding decrease in local debt there would be no local debt. In fact State and local governments on the whole would have a small surplus in their treasuries! So it looks as if one more effort to alibi our national debt has flopped.

THE WORKER PAYS

Some of our best known labor leaders seem to have taken a lesson from Washington. More and more their actions are guided by political considerations; the interest of the working man having a good and permanent job is apparently regarded as secondary to the business of jockeying about in an effort to gain personal advantage.

It is no secret who pays for this—in opportunity as well as the coin of the realm. The worker pays. He pays for labor racketeering. He pays for useless and unjustifiable strikes which throw him out of a job for months on end. He pays for the internecine warfare which has disturbed labor's ranks for years.

There can be no question but that the cause of legitimate unionism which will advance the real interests of the workers has been seriously damaged by the extremists. And whether they shall continue their destruction is up to the rank and file of labor.

J. F. Fliegel Files For Dist. Attorney

J. F. Fliegel, Medford Attorney, this week announced candidacy for District Attorney for Jackson County on the Republican ticket, with the slogan: "Economy and efficiency with prompt and just enforcement of the law."

Mr. Fliegel, 41, was born in Wisconsin, came to Oregon in 1909 and located with his family on a Willamette valley farm. He attended and worked his way through Salem High School and attended Oregon State College and Willamette University, receiving his LL. B. degree from Willamette University in 1922. The same year, upon regular state bar examination he was admitted to practice law in all courts of the state of Oregon. In 1928 he was admitted to practice law in the United States District Court for the District of Oregon.

He came to Medford in 1923 and immediately engaged in the general practice of law and has actively conducted his practice in Medford since that time.

Mr. Fliegel is well known in legal, civic and fraternal circles. Soon upon his arrival in Medford he was appointed to the City Planning Commission on which body he served for 8 years, later on the city council to which office he was elected after an appointment to fill an unexpired term. Upon his resignation from the council, he having moved outside the precinct, Mr. Fliegel was again appointed to the city planning commission which body he is serving at this time.

Mr. Fliegel is married, a home owner and taxpayer, and has a family of one son. He is an Elk and a Mason and a member of the American Legion, having served in the world war. He has devoted a great deal of his time to the affairs of the ex-service man.

Mr. Fliegel stated, "I believe that proper management in the office of district attorney will save the taxpayers thousands of dollars and if elected, I will assure economy in the operation of the office in keeping with efficiency, prompt and just enforcement of the law to the best of my ability. Prosecutions of law violations, in view of the efficiency of the state police, sheriff's office and city police have greatly diminished and the greater responsibility of the district attorney is as legal advisor and counsel to the officers of the county."

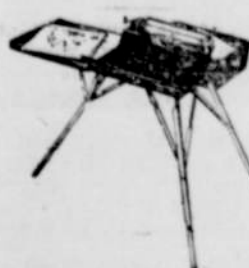
