EDITORIALS

YANKEE THRIFT TURNS THE TIDE

Real prosperity can be brought about again in this country only by a revival of "old fashioned Yankee thrift and individual initiative." This is not opinionated theory but a hard fact, and the State of Connecticut is taking full advantage of it. While the rest of the country continues on a "witches hunt" for Utopia, Connecticut is determinedly pursuing a course of progress.

The incumbent governor was elected on a platform pledge to establish a "friendly government"—friendly to business, industry and labor. The state budget has been balanced without resorting to new taxes—relief rolls have been halved—factory space is at a premium—169 new companies moved to Connecticut in 1939 alone—and employment is higher than in 1929. The state has found that "there is no substitute for a good job in private industry."

No effort was made to "steal" industry from other states, or to use high pressure methods. Labor standards were not sacrificed. In fact industries which move across the border in search of "cheap" labor are not welcome. Sweatshops have no place in American life.

Politicians who claim that private enterprise is a "worn out" system, have only to observe Connecticut to have their claims shattered. The only thing that has momentarily "worn out" private enterprise is constant ballyhoo, indiscriminate legislation and excessive taxation deliberately directed toward destructive ends. America's millions of unemployed can learn a lesson from Connecticut. By contrast they can see the damage that constant political persecution has done to the private institutions by which we all must live.

Where there is individual opportunity there is progress; where there is no individual opportunity there is no progress.

IF A GUY with long whiskers drops around by the house one of these days and demands \$311 from each member of the family, don't send for the police. For that's what it would cost every last one of us if we were to retire the present national debt of 41 billion dollars. That's another new high, and it also happens to be within 4 billions of the debt maximum as set by law. So either we'll have to quit spending soon or nudge up the limit. What's your guess?

\$50 to \$60 per month were being paid by the Social Security Act." Senator Wagner started to agree with this view when Senator Sheridan Downey stopped him short with a few COLD FIGURES. Said Senator Downey, "Your statements are just simply not correct." "Under the Social Security 'charity plan' or Social Security Act, the average paid is \$17.31. Let me also say they do not count the 15% of the contributors who will never get anything." "Counting them the average comes down to \$15.99 per month". Father Ryan surprised some of the listeners by observing "Let me say that I am in entire agreement with the underlying theory of the Townsend Plan as regards the distribution of the National Income. We have to put out more purchasing power into the hands of those who will use it." In spite of this but in all sincerity he insisted that the Townsend Plan would not work. He also confused the net income and the gross income of the United States. Rep. Martin Smith brought light on this tangled subject. He said "I think I can furnish the figures for the gross income of the United States. As given by Dr. E. A. Goldenweiser, director of research and statistics for the Board of Governor of the Federal Reserve System. He has estimated the amount for 1938 at five hundred and fifty three BILLIONS of dollars." That floored Father Ryan and he cheerfully admitted it. "Alright" he said smilingly. The most interesting part of the debate was the ignorance exhibited by those who were opposed to the Plan. Senator Downey is wishing there were someone who put up a real debate with him in the Senate. He says "So far I haven't been able to get anybody to debate with us in the Senate."

We are delighted to announce the organizing of a Youth Club in Central Point. Rudy Singler, primarily responsible for the successful culmination of his efforts in this respect and in conjunction with the members of the Central Point older and already established Club, presented the application for a charter to C. W. Wetteman on the platform of the Friday Night program of Club No. 2. Mr. Wetteman handed him back the application, suggesting that Rudy Singler mail the same into headquarters himself.
