In absorbing a 2-0 defeat at the hands of Medford Senior High the Pointers played a fine game. Holland allowed only 2 hits but costly errors and lack of bunched hits caused the loss.

Letters were awarded in assembly Wednesday to Hilkey and Taylor, catchers; Wyatt, Holland and Pinkham, pitchers; Williams, Glone and Parks, infielders; Copinger and Burns, outfielders.

The team will face a heavy loss by graduation as Holland, Pinkham, Williams, Glone, Parks, and Copinger have all played their last game for the Pointers.

Only catchers Taylor and Hilkey, pitcher Wyatt and outfielder Burns will return as lettermen on which to build next year's squad.

Much credit is due to Coach Hulbert for developing some fine baseball talent and we can be assured of a good team next year.
