Chub Minnows Not Allowed for Bait

Fishermen carrying chub minnows for use as bait in lakes of Oregon planted exclusively to trout are not only violating the law but, perhaps unknowingly, aiding a definite threat to trout life of these lakes, according to officials of the Oregon State Game Commission.

Chubs are of a cannibalistic type and therefore prey on other fish, destroying them in large numbers.

During recent years numerous fishermen have carried chub minnows to the trout lakes, using them for bait and in some instance dumped surplus bait into the lakes.

State Police Sergeant Ed Walker stopped a fisherman two years ago who was just in the act of dumping a bucketful of chub minnows in Diamond Lake.

Under provisions of the game code, it is unlawful to fish with minnows in any waters other than those from which the minnows come. All sportsmen are urged to cooperate with the game commission in preventing the use of chub minnows in exclusive trout lakes of the state and thus aid in the preservation of game fishing in these lakes.

We know our numbers too. We will have fun this summer. Johnny has a pet bunny. It is white with pink eyes. Johnny calls him Pink Eye.

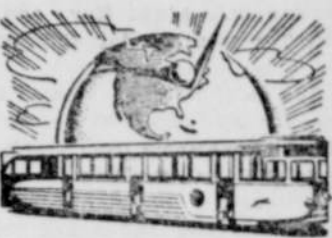
We have a little visitor. Her name is Ella Anderson.

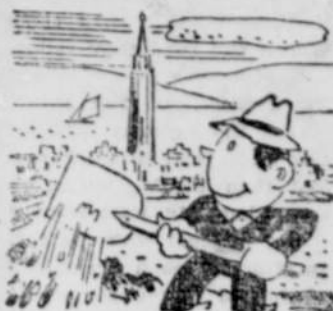
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ELEVATOR FOR FISH

Festival Dates Set for Aug. 9-17

ASHLAND, May 29—Dates for the sixth annual Shakespearean Festival, to be staged in the world's only outdoor civic Elizabethan theatre here, have been definitely set as August 9 to August 17.

This was made known following release of advertising and informational pamphlets, to be distributed among chambers of commerce, tourist agencies, auto travel bureaus and similar agencies, this week. A thorough canvass of the entire Pacific coast as well as central tourist points in the inter-mountain areas, the central states and the eastern seaboard, is planned.

With a new director, William David Cottrell, former Hollywood dramatic coach handling the production work this season, current plans point to a more streamlined and modernized repertoire.

The four selected plays are regarded as the more bolsterous of Shakespeare's works and will be given in a breezy tempo. Chosen for presentation are, "As You Like It", "The Comedy of Errors", a hold over from last season's list, "The Merry Wives of Windsor" and "Much Ado About Nothing."

Dual presentation for each play will be followed. "The Merry Wives of Windsor" opens the schedule on August and will be given again on August 14. "Much Ado About Nothing" has been slated for August 10 and 15; "The Comedy of Errors", August 12 and 16; and "As You Like It", August 13 and 17.

Preliminary castings will start at the auditorium of the Southern Oregon College of Education here the week beginning June 3rd. Try-outs will be under the direct supervision of Mr. Cottrell, assisted by Lois M. Bowmer, who heads the designing and costuming departments.

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Join High School Contest



LIKE THOUSANDS of other high-school age boys throughout the United States, Donald J. Daly, 17 (left), and Jack Kaufman, 14, pupils at Dearborn, Mich., high schools, have enrolled in the Ford Good Drivers League. They are seen here looking over the League's new 64-page book, "How To Become a Skilled Driver", which is sent free to every boy who enrolls. Reading the book is the first step toward competing in the League's \$30,000 Good Driving Contest next summer. Forty-eight boys winning state championships will receive free trips to the New York World's Fair for themselves and their sponsors and take part in the national contest to be held there. Boys competing in the finals will each

receive a scholarship award, ranging in value up to a first prize of a \$5,000 university scholarship. Membership in the League is free and is open to all boys in the United States between the ages of 14 and 18 who are qualified and legally authorized to drive a car in their home states. Each boy who enrolls receives, in addition to the League's book, a handsome membership card and button, and a complete kit of material for entering the contest. Enrollment blanks may be secured at any Ford dealership or by writing the Ford Good Drivers League, Dearborn, Mich. In many high schools eligible boys are enrolling in groups, the ceremonies being conducted right in the classrooms, under direction of their teachers.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD HUMOR IN YOUR PICTURES



He just couldn't quite make it. Humorous shots such as this add spice to your album—plenty of chances for them occur in any home.

HUMOROUS pictures are quite rare—and perhaps that is the very reason they have such lasting appeal. If you want snapshots in your album that will never grow old, then keep your eyes open for picture chances that tickle your funnybone.

There are plenty of such opportunities, particularly around homes that have children—which is not to say, of course, that grown-ups don't have their absurd moments too. And if you stay alert for such moments, with your camera loaded and placed where you can get it readily, you'll likely garner some much-prized shots for your album.

Sometimes, it's true, you'll have to reenact things to get your picture. For example, when you find Johnny has been raiding the cookie jar again, just let him demonstrate how he did it, for the camera—and his guilty look will give you a picture that takes high rank in your collection.

When the youngest member of the family gathers his toys and toddles off to bed, finds he can't quite make the grade, and drops off to

sleep half in bed and half out—then you have another picture opportunity well worth seizing. Such a shot, so comic yet so heart-warming, holds more appeal than a handful of routine snaps.

Some situations merit a picture but the circumstances don't recommend taking it immediately. For example, when Daddy goes to hang a picture, but hammers his thumb instead, in such a case, just wait until things cool down a bit—then shoot a picture of him blowing on the injured member, with the hammer and step ladder in the immediate background.

It's fun to think up ideas for humorous pictures. Recall funny things that have happened in the past—then reenact them for the camera. These shots lend spice to your album—they'll give extra pleasure to you and your friends, especially if you do them realistically. And meanwhile, always keep your camera loaded and handy, ready to picture the funny little events that may occur almost any time around the home.
