Mr. and Mrs. Harry Powell and Arden Pinkham drove to Prospect Sunday and saw the town team win the baseball game.

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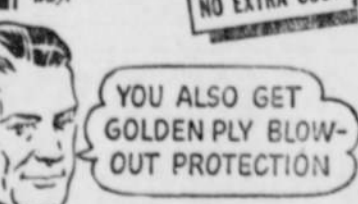
