Roberta Wertz graduated from the Ashland Normal this spring and will teach near Bend this fall.

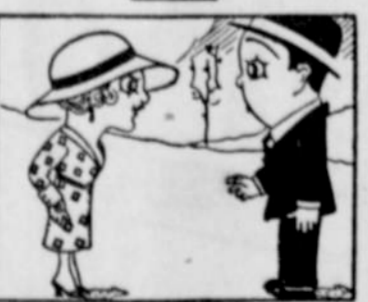
Mr. and Mrs. Roger Yost have purchased the Langston place and will move in soon.
