Farm Debt Service Offered by FSA

The Farm Security Administration through its farm debt adjustment service is assisting debt burdened farmers in Jackson County to continue with their farming operations where otherwise they would have been unable to operate. Advises Mr. Eugene Hampton, Farm Security Supervisor for Jackson county.

"Farmers are being assisted through a committee of farmers and civic leaders in the county in getting obligations refinanced, which in some cases means prevention of foreclosure of property and in other cases in getting contracts rewritten and obligations extended. This service is not restricted to Farm Security Administration borrowers, and creditors as well as farm debtors are eligible to apply," continued Mr. Hampton.

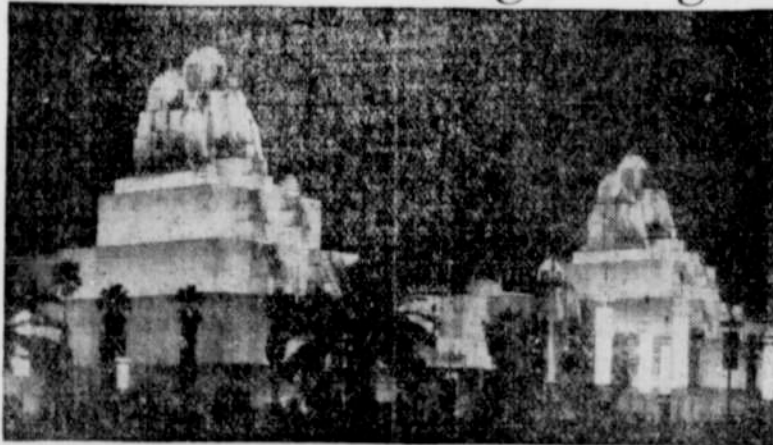
Earle Stanton to Manage Lapham Sales
