WASHINGTON, D.C.—While American Red Cross representatives speeded relief operations among 8,000,000 war refugees in southern France, plans for strengthening Red

Cross forces in London in anticipation of the pending siege of the British Isles, were announced by Chairman Norman H. Davis.

David K. E. Bruce, a member of the American Red Cross war relief advisory committee, is the latest appointee to be assigned for European duty, Chairman Davis said. Mr. Bruce is en route to London, where he will act in an advisory capacity with the newly-formed American Red Cross Committee, of which U. S. Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy is honorary chairman and Dan Grant is chairman. Fred Bate, National Broadcasting Company London war analyst, has been named vice-chairman of the group.

The homes of some 600,000 French refugees were destroyed during the German invasion, according to cables from Red Cross delegates in France. Advice stated that plans are under way to move refugees back to their home communities, but that disorganization will continue among the French people for months to come. Estimates place the number of men, women and children in the refugee provinces at 8,000,000.

This total includes 6,000,000 French, 1,500,000 Belgians, 50,000 Dutch and 70,000 Luxembourgiens, Chairman Davis said he had been informed.
