Huge Stage Nearly Ready for Pageant

SALEM, July 17—Construction is now under way on the huge stage upon which will be presented the Salem Centennial pageant on July 31, August 1, 2 and 3. This mammoth outdoor set, which is being erected in front of the grandstand at the Salem state fairgrounds, will be the background for one of the most pretentious and colorful historical and musical presentations ever attempted in the west. The stage itself will be one block in width, half a block in depth, and the scenery will rise to a height of 50 feet above the ground.

Three thousand persons are expected to participate in the pageant which will be presented in five cycles. Each cycle will be a complete representation of the progress of the Oregon country and Salem "From Wilderness to Wonderland". There will be a male chorus of more than 40 voices and mixed choruses in which several hundred singers will participate.

An innovation in stage technique will be the use of transparencies at each side of the great stage upon which will be projected early day scenes of Salem and the Willamette valley followed by scenes of the present day.

Officer Training for Naval Reserve Offered

The first group of college men enlisted in Class V-7 of the Naval Reserve for officer training, left Pacific Northwest cities Thursday, July 11th for New York City where they will embark on the USS WYOMING for a training course to determine their qualifications for further instruction and eventual commissioning as officers in the Naval Reserve.

Included in the group sent east by the Portland Navy Recruiting Headquarters in Portland, were students from the University of Oregon, University of Portland and the University of Washington. This group will arrive in New York on Monday, July 15th and will be assembled with groups from other districts on board the USS Illinois, training ship of the New York Militia, for further trans-

fer to the battleship Wyoming which will bear the embryo officers to sea on July 16th for the first step in their training program.

The cruise of the Wyoming is the first of a program determined upon by President Roosevelt to train 5,000 college men annually for commissions in the Naval Reserve. Further training cruises will be made by three battleships during the period August 19th to September 14th.

Applications for enlistment for this training are being accepted at all Navy Recruiting Stations.

Purchase by Southern Pacific Company this month of the Pacific Truck Express will greatly increase Oregon Pacific's capacity to serve Southwestern shippers, according to Herman W. Klein, general freight agent, Portland.

The Pacific Truck Express provides local trucking service in Oregon and a through service to California points. Present schedules and service will be maintained or improved, Klein said, and acquisition of the line will make it possible to coordinate rail and truck shipments, providing greater flexibility of freight transportation for Oregon shippers.

Southern Pacific has provided overnight service with store-door pick-up and delivery between Portland and many western Oregon points for the past several years. With acquisition of the Pacific Truck Express this over night service can now be extended to virtually every point

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
