

Sights at Fair Interestingly Told By Representative

The General Electric exhibit was a most interesting one; there are 3 separate sections—Steinmetz Hall, The House of Magic and the Main Exhibit.

At Steinmetz Auditorium, we saw man-made lighting, a bolt of 10 million volts of electricity crashed down before us and the noise accompanying, made us all jump, although we were forewarned; another bolt of lightning hit a log and then some splinters. It was a display not soon forgotten.

The DuPont display was outstanding—a bale of cotton and a tree were shown on the left side of the stage and on the right were shown hundreds of articles made from these 2 basic substances.

In another display, coal and sand were shown and opposite, the products that are being made from them. Nylon thread is one of the newer items produced from coal, water and air.

A beautiful garment made from glass which was produced from sand and coal.

DuPont emphasizes that "Chemistry makes for better living" and that Chemistry will provide more jobs if capital and labor will work together for the good of mankind.

The most popular exhibit, the No. 1 Hit, is "Futurama" by General Motors; it is a magic flight through time and space into the world of 1960. It is so pleasant because you have a cushioned chair in an air-conditioned room, and you are carried through space looking down to earth you get a view of future roads, model homes and farms all in miniature. Thousands of midjet autos, trucks and airplanes are moving simultaneously and without chance of accidents because of the new highway system soon to be constructed.

The greatest need of the nation today is airplanes. General Motors is showing the "Allison Motor" which is made at Indianapolis and generally used in the latest airplanes for the government.

We were interested in this entirely new factory, of 3 separate buildings, getting a view at nighttime. The factory is running full time in eight hours shifts. The buildings have thousands of windows, plenty of daylight but illuminated at night. The glass in the windows is the new product of DuPont Co. and but recently put on the market.

On account of the new espionage laws recently enacted by Congress, no one is allowed to enter and a high iron fence surrounds each building.

In reply to our many questions about this factory we were answered by "I Don't Know" but did learn that the output increased 100 per cent in July over June.

The men in the plant must pass rigid tests and they wear badges and have passes, and even then are not allowed to go from one department to another unless they get a special permit.

The "Railroads on Parade" deserves mention. It is a display of all the models from the first invention up to the present streamlined trains with Diesel Engine. President Lincoln descends from a train of the '60's in the hour long musical pageant of historic trains in action. This railway display is so much more elaborate than was given at other fairs. The evolution of steam power was interestingly displayed.

In the Chrysler play-house, we saw and heard the talking Plymouth, and then an animated show, the different parts of the auto appeared on the stage and then jumped into place, soon to make a complete automobile.

The Frozen Forest, showing trees covered with ice was a fine place to cool off. It shows what air conditioning will do.

The illumination and fireworks were so beautiful that this writer can not much more than simply speak of the beauty. The water fountains were in action all day but after dark, the water was turned to fine mist, colored lights were thrown on in various shades and at certain recurring intervals the fireworks were displayed, dropping into the mist. While this display was on, the band was playing the National Anthem of Finland. We have often heard grand music, and seen fine fireworks, also colored lights thrown on water displays but all these to be heard and seen with such orderly timing and perfect coordination produced an outstanding scene.
