BILL TO FURTHER REGULATE SALE AND USE OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR

This is a bill strengthening the present liquor law and should be passed. VOTE 310 X YES.

BILL REPEALING PRESENT LIQUOR LAW; AUTHORIZING PRIVATE SALE, LICENSED, TAXED.

This law, if passed, would put us right back to the old saloon. This bare-faced attempt to bring back the old licensed saloon and do away with the present state control of liquor sales should be defeated by an overwhelming vote. VOTE 313 X NO.

AMENDMENT LEGALIZING CERTAIN GAMBLING AND GAMING DEVICES AND CERTAIN LOTTERIES.

This is an effort on the part of the owners of pinball, punch boards and other gambling devices to legalize their use by constitutional amendment. Everyone knows the demoralizing effect of these gambling de-

VICES on the youth of the land. Let's snuff the bill under so far it will never be heard of again. VOTE 315 X NO.

BILL TO REPEAL THE OREGON MILK CONTROL LAW

There has been an effort on the part of the opponents of this repeal of the Milk Control Law to begot the issue and make the voters believe that the quality of our milk is at stake. The fact is that there is no sanitary inspection under the Milk Control Board. That is entirely under the Department of Agriculture and the City and County Health Departments, which are entirely separate institutions. The Milk Control Law is strictly a business regulation and hasn't any relationship to sanitation. However, there are many good features in the present Milk Control Law which should be retained. Therefore we are not going to make any recommendation regarding its repeal. But we do not wish our readers to be under any misapprehension regarding the sanitary regulations as to the sale of milk. A vote to repeal the Milk Law will in no wise effect these regulations nor their enforcement.
