I have always said that the salmon snappers are a bunch of fellows who have to stoop down to a low level to snag the salmon after they have failed to catch them in a regular sporting way. And I still think they are. But I have a little better estimate of them than I have of those who use dynamite to kill fish.

Last summer down at High Bank I found a dozen dead steelhead lying in deep holes and I use to dive in after them and bring them out to cut them up to see what was the matter with them. One small charge of dynamite can do a great deal of damage within a 50 foot radius and it is claimed by scientists that the charge practically kills everything.

Well, this spring it looks like dynamites are still on the job for I found three big salmon weighing over 25 pounds. I cut up one of them and found the same story of broken blood vessels. Something will have to be done at once and the fellows who use such detestable, cruel methods, should be given a stiff fine and jailed for a year. Last fall I found hundreds of salmon lying from Hybee bridge down to Gold Ray dam and they are all cut up by those fishermen who want fresh eggs. They use snag hooks or use dynamite and catch hundreds of salmon just to get fresh salmon eggs and it is my firm belief that some of them are making a living by selling fresh eggs which usually are heavily demanded by bait fishermen during the run of the summer steelhead.

That is why I would like to see that Rogue River is barred to boat fishing and also to egg fishing. I would not mind if the fishermen only use spinners and flies on Rogue river. There are two rivers being closed to bait fishing or spinners in Oregon. They are part of the Deschutes river and Metolius river. Only fly fishing are allowed in those rivers and I don't see any harm at all if the law were applied to Rogue river.

If so that will mean the lessening of the annual slaughter of salmon by those who want fresh eggs. And to think we used to blame it all on the commercial netmen at Gold Beach.

Story of African Rubber Plantation

(Continued from Last Week)

Well, I am about the busiest woman on the plantation and that's no joke. Have sure been giving my electric sewing machine a work out and have made fourteen dresses for the front room and dining room. Have all the bedroom curtains yet to make and there are sixteen altogether, plus the bathroom windows to cover. I have to remodel all the summer dresses which I bought in Chicago and brought along also I have to cut off the bottoms of all my evening dresses and house coats as nothing can touch the floor down here because of germs. I also have two evening dresses yet to be made for which I will have the material as soon as our lost trunk is located. In addition to my sewing I have typed endlessly on letters, my diary (which is way behind by now) and everything else. I have kept faithfully at my diary by writing it in shorthand each day so I won't forget the many things which happen but I have all that yet to transcribe on the typewriter. — And—in addition to this we have just completed our third move since arriving in Liberia—and—in addition to that, I am about to become a working girl again for at least six or eight months. What's this they say about Liberia being a "paradise for women" for they can sleep all day if they want to, play golf, tennis, ping pong, and loaf? I'd like to know

what it is all about myself.

First, about our moving—We first lived with the Godleys on the top of Harbel Hill. If you have received my other three letters you will know what I mean by Harbel Hill, but if not I will say briefly that it is the newest and best residential district on the 75,000 acre plantation. There are sixteen houses on these large rolling hills and the homes as well as the scenery are unbelievably beautiful. We stayed with Godleys from October 2nd to October 14th when we moved to Division No. 1 which was the first division on the plantation and which, naturally has the oldest houses and the largest rubber trees and how nice our house was. Well, the 30th of October we received our moving notice to move to Harbel Hill so November 1st we moved bag and baggage at 5:30 A.M. to our present residence on top of the world. This makes the third place we have lived since arriving here but this is supposed to be permanent and I am inclined to believe it will be for this house on Division No. 1 was temporary until there was a vacancy on Harbel Hill. I took pictures of the house yesterday so you can see how nice it is. It is a bit smaller than the Division No. 1 house but is still much larger than your house—that will give you an idea of the size of the place. Plenty big enough for me and friend husband I would say. The servants' quarters have a bath and shower downstairs but we only have one bath room upstairs instead of two which we had at the other house. This house is situated so that I can sit in the front room and watch them play golf as the edge of the golf course comes up to the side of our house. I can see all nice holes of the course and it is beautiful, so green and so perfect looking. Maybe I will get in some golf if I have time. It would be grand exercise. It is much cooler here, in fact I wear a jacket in the evening just sitting at home, and at night we sleep under a sheet and a double blanket.

Joe and I have both felt perfectly wonderful since we arrived in Africa. I think we get more rest than we did at home and too, when you sleep at night there is no noise around and you rest better, consequently I quite often get up when Joe does in the morning at 5:00 A.M. (can you imagine me doing such a terrible thing) simply because I have my sleep out. This way I get a lot of things accomplished in one day. Will ring off for now and write another letter before the boat sails. Joe just tells me that the S. S. Lashaway is coming up the coast in one week and then after that boat there will be a lapse of one month before another comes. Hope every one at home is feeling grand and give our love to all.
