### My Epileptic Goats

Besides a sharp noise or the sudden appearance of an intruder, the only other thing I know of which causes the goats to have an attack is an attempt on their part to jump a fence or a ditch. Their leg muscles are, obviously, not all they should be, and they are poor jumpers. Add to that the effort of trying to jump even as far as two feet—either horizontally or vertically—and the inevitable result is a seizure.

This inability to jump, I discovered, enhances the market value of these animals. Because with this failing can be imprisoned in a field by a very low fence, and because low fences are

cheaper and easier to build than high fences, some farmers prefer "epileptic" goats to the ordinary variety.

Offsetting this, however, is the fact that "epileptic" goats are less prolific than normal goats. These goats have kids but once a year, while common goats bear semi-annually. I have, of course, never bred my "epileptic" goats with normal animals.

Usually, though not always, in newborn kids no trace of this weakness can be detected. But as they get older, and this is invariably true, the characteristic becomes more and more marked. By the time the kids

are about three to six months old they react to fright in exactly the same way as their progenitors. Of the fact that the malady is hereditary, therefore, there can be no question.

Discussing my goats in a technical paper printed in the Archives of Neurology and Psychiatry, under the title "Paroxysmal Hypertonia Induced by Affect—A Symptom in Man and in Lower Animals", and later reprinted in pamphlet form by the American Medical Association, Dr. Max Levin, of the Harrisburg (Pennsylvania) State Hospital for the Insane, said, "The 'nervous' goats probably suffer from fear and surprise cause the leg muscles of goats of this breed to become absolutely rigid, a reaction presumably inhibited in normal animals."

Dr. Levin emphasizes, however, that nothing is known with certainty about the origin of this condition. One is on shaky ground, he says in effect, in trying to answer the whys, whens and whens of this peculiar ailment.

In making his study, Dr. Levin wrote to me requesting specific information about my goats, and I, of course, furnished him with every possible detail. Many physicians and psychologists have likewise written me for data about the goats in hope that the behavior of these animals might throw some light upon similar attacks in human beings. Every one of these inquiries I have answered to the best of my ability.

Innumerable people have written to me too suggesting that I try this, that or the other cure. I have experimented with the majority of these suggestions, but to date not one of them has ever ameliorated the condition in the slightest degree. And, inevitably, I have gotten countless letters from people who believed that the entire thing was a hoax. "Aw, come on, quit the kidding," about sums up the attitude of these people who apparently believe that they have been made the "goat". Strange as it seems, believe it or not, my goat story is entirely true.
