Mason Celebrates End of Debt

such an occasion and congratulated the Masonic order and also the Eastern Star on having the hall paid for and being out of debt. Mr. Faber gave a brief history of the original building, which was built for a Y.M.C.A. In the summer of 1910, there were four churches in Central Point which had revivals and many young people had joined the churches and it was decided that they should have a place for recreation. A group of men met and organized a board to go after a Y.M.C.A. John Cowley was elected president, I. R. Hamilton secretary and treasurer. The rest of the board consisted of George and Henry Farman, Henry Wiley, D. McKillip, A. W. Beebe, Frank Thompson, J. O. Isaacson, Robert Kyle, W. E. Kahler, J. S. Barnett, F. F. Cooper,

City School supt., E. C. Faber, L. Hatfield and ministers here at that time Rev. K. H. Slekafosse, Rev. H. N. Aldrich and Rev. J. B. Coen. Their goal was to raise \$6548.50. They went out in small groups of two or three and in a few days the entire amount was pledged, the largest donation being \$500 from an unknown friend. R. Kyle donated \$200 and there were twenty donations of \$100 and fifteen donations of \$50 and many smaller donations. Next week we will start a list of the donors and the amount donated, thinking the list of these names will be of interest to the readers of this paper.

After the building was partly finished Mr. J. O. Isaacson suggested that it be given up but the majority insisted that it be finished and one member went him one better and suggested that a swimming pool be built, the pool which cost another \$1000 was built and the boys would gather there and stay in the water until cold and stiff and then lay on the porch in the sun. They spent so much time in the pool that they were all suffering from it so the pool was closed. The board decided to hold meetings there every Sunday afternoon but after no one attended the meeting except the members of the board, who attended church both morning and evening the meetings were closed. The City Council had kindly furnished water for the pool the first summer.

For a number of years the Y.M.C.A. flourished with about ninety per cent of the Central Point people being paid members. Some of the pledges were never paid. People began to lose interest and what started as a

rosy dream was becoming a heartache. The Central Point bank loaned money to finish the building and carry on the work. W. G. Mayfield held the mortgage at the time the Masons bought the hall.

This was a very interesting story to many of the people present who knew nothing of the history of the building.
