

Interest in Catch Cards Increasing

Return of catch record cards from sportsmen thus far this season exceeds in number all the cards returned last year, according to C. A. Lockwood, assistant supervisor of the Oregon State Game Commission.

"The sportsmen are making an excellent showing in the use of the catch record cards this year," said Mr. Lockwood. "This is encouraging in view of the fact that the cards are essential to the completion of the survey of lakes and streams, now being conducted in various parts of the state."

"These cards should be filled out by every angler after each fishing trip. The cards require no signature and are postage free. Numerous sportsmen's organizations throughout the state are giving the Commission real cooperation in the campaign to acquaint anglers with the use of the catch record cards."

The cards may be obtained from the Portland office of the Game Commission, as well as in practically every sporting goods store, and from game license agents, Mr. Lockwood pointed out.

Story of African Rubber Plantation

(Continued from Last Week)

When the S. S. Otho came in Tuesday from the States, it was an exciting day for everyone. The mail was taken to the home of the man who is secretary to the General Manager down here and he was forced to play the role of mailman. It is customary to take it to his home from the boat and he might just as well plan on holding open house for the evening for everyone takes a drive to his home and we all sort out our mail. Mail is strewn all over his front room and everyone is pawing around for his mail. There is no question but that you get everything what is coming to you for you don't leave the place until you have looked at everyone's mail to see if, by chance, it has been addressed to you. It sure is a picnic and you will then see people stuck away in every corner reading letters—some of them can't wait to get back to their own home. So you see how tickled we are to get letters from all of you.

I was mentioning that I couldn't read the letter which I had already written to you, Mother, which isn't mailed as yet. The reason is that if you lay an envelope down or have it in the desk or anyplace it will automatically seal itself because of the moisture in the air. My stationary which I brought with me had all the envelopes sealed when I went to use them. Here all the envelopes which are used at the office must have a strip of wax paper between the envelope, itself, and the flap. The wax paper sticks enough to the glue on the flap to hold it in place but it can be readily removed when you want to use them. If you ever get a letter and it looks like it had been opened it will probably be my fault while I was trying to get the empty envelope open so I could put a letter in.

One of the things which we must watch constantly down here is Mildew. We fight it constantly. Joe's leather brief case was covered with flowers of mildew before I realized that it would be effected, so was my fitted case. Now that we have smartened up a bit we buy an almost colorless form of polish for shining shoes and we have our steward boy clean off all the mildew and then polish the leather with this polish. It will keep much longer before starting to mildew again. It is no trouble except that you must watch and see that the boy takes care of them, however, we do not have to do

it ourselves. As I have mentioned we have a small tubular electric heater in our clothes closets and also have a 200 watt bulb which burns constantly. Inside the closets (dry closets or hot rooms they are called) things will keep the same as they do in the states so we keep as much of the leather goods, silks and such in them as is possible. I keep my helmet in there also as I do not wear it very much. Joe wears his constantly as he is in the open more between the hours of 10:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. so Johnny, the steward boy, is busy keeping it clean. It will accumulate mildew on the sweat band between wearings and the white part of it will turn green if not cleaned constantly. Needless to say, Johnny is a spotless thing and he sure keeps that helmet snow white for "Massa". There are many inconveniences which, if we didn't have servants, would be a very boring and tiresome situation but as it is now we live the same as we would in the states and the boys (servants) keep up the endless fight against mildew, mold, rot, insects, cobwebs and the like. The dry rooms are sprayed regularly in the fight against these huge cockroaches which they have down here (they will eat great holes in the clothes otherwise) and we rarely see one in the front part of the house. The linen closets and practically every place is also sprayed daily. Laundry is done daily and I am going to sack (fire) my washman the end of this month (month to you) because he sometimes doesn't iron the

washing the same day as he washes and it is apt to pick up a moldy smell. (Must quite this letter and get to work, the boss just came in. I am now an employee of Firestone Plantations Co., West Africa, and am again a "poor working gail". Will tell you about it later).
