

Thirteen Troops Attend Camporee

Three boy scout troops from Medford took top honors at the Boy Scout Camporee held last Saturday and Sunday at the Elks' Picnic Grounds near Medford and planned for all troops in Jackson and Josephine counties. One hundred and forty five scouts and their leaders from Medford, Ashland, Gold Hill, Central Point, Eagle Point, Grants Pass, and Jerome Prairie took part in the big overnight demonstration. Thirteen troops were represented.

There are three classifications of ratings; the first is "Proficient"; the second, "Standard"; and third "Participating". In "Participating", Central Point, troop 40, with J. E. Vincent, scoutmaster, won first. Second prize went to troop 2 of Medford, Dick Woodcock, scoutmaster, and the third to troop 13 of Ashland, Grant Davis, scoutmaster.

Judges in all of the events were L. L. Colvill of the U.S. Forest Service at Grants Pass, J. A. McDougall, district commissioner of Medford; John Eddy, district commissioner of Medford; Paul Peterson, district commissioner from Gold Hill; Kenneth Neill, district commissioner from Grants Pass; and Kenneth Wells, boy scout executive. According to the judges, the work exhibited was excellent in the light of the fact that this was the first such event held in Southern Oregon in many years. Special commendation was given to troop 43 of Eagle Point. This group is very small having only six members, yet with almost no real camping equipment they did a very outstanding job and received a "Standard" rating.

Points are scored as follows: student activities—possible fifty points; faculty vote—possible thirty points; and student vote—possible thirty points.

The honor cup has been presented annually for the past nineteen years. It was first presented to the school by E. H. Hedrick, who was principal of Central Point High School.

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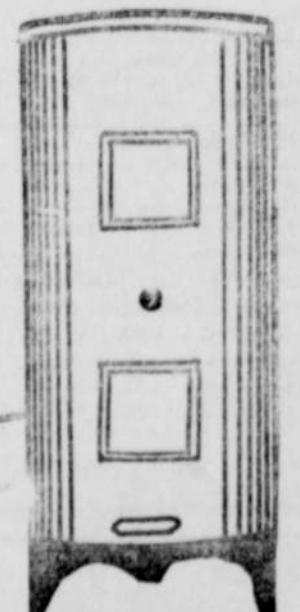


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
