With the coming of the cantonment in the near future it is far

more important to conserve the fish life in the river so it is my belief that a new law banning the use of all forms of salmon egg fishing, would do more good to the river than all methods of restocking the river. And if the new law is put in effect it would mean the smaller annual slaughter of salmon just for the mere use of salmon eggs.

This year is the big run of salmon and sometime in July you will see hundreds of salmon lying along the shores, their stomach all split up by the nigger-fishermen for eggs. Of course there will be lots of salmon dead from natural causes that may be split up but there will be too many that will be snagged and mightily few really caught by the mouth.

Well, that's off my chest and I know at least two or maybe three who will jump all over on me and berate me as they have done in the past but there will be a lot more men who will agree with me as they have always done.
