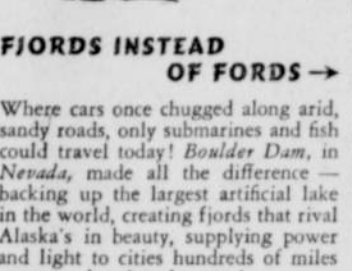
OL' MAN RIVER'S BIRTHPLACE →

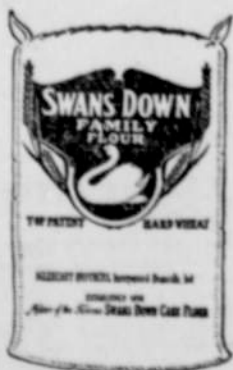
