New Poison Plant Menace to Humans

A relative new poison plant has invaded many parts of Oregon recently and constitutes a distinct menace to those who may not recognize it, says Dr. Helen Gilkey, curator of the herbarium at Oregon State College. This plant is known by various names such as poison hemlock, wild parsley, or even wild parsnip, though it is not the familiar large-leaved wild parsnip. The scientific name is *Conium maculatum*. First specimens of this were reported in Oregon as recently as 1933, when it was found near has since been reported from almost all sections of western Oregon and may be present in many parts of eastern Oregon as well.

The plant is just as poisonous as the dangerous water hemlock, and constitutes even more of a menace because its hollow stem might be used by children for making whistles, says Dr. Gilkey. It makes a showy growth and, when growing in its favorite peat or swamp soil, will attain heights of five or six feet or even more. It is found on drier ground but does not grow so large there.

Two ways of identifying this plant are from characteristic purple mottlings on the stem, and by the fact that when parts of the plant are taken indoors, they give off a distinctive mouse-like odor. Because of its rather attractive appearance, with fine-cut leaves, white flower heads and seed pods that resemble dill seed, this plant has even been found growing in shady places in private gardens.

Dr. Gilkey reports that the plant is poisonous to stock as well as humans and may cause trouble in hay. It is a biennial, producing foliage the first year and going to seed the next.

Many Lose License For Drunk Driving

CHICAGO, June 30—Oregon motorists who had their driving licenses revoked in May outnumbered "all other causes" by nearly two to one, declared Charles R. Jones, Executive Vice President of the American Business Men's Research Foundation, as he reviewed the official report of the Secretary of State.

Of a total of 162 revocations during the month, said Mr. Jones, 104 were for driving while intoxicated, while 58 were for all other causes. This is a considerable increase over the previous month, when out of 156 revocations 78 were for intoxication and the same number for other causes. More Oregon motorists had their licenses revoked in May for drunken driving than in any month this year, said Mr. Jones.

Beaver Boys' State Ends Big Session

Actual experience in organization, self-government, politics, citizenship and democracy was afforded 275 Oregon boys who made up the fifth annual Beaver Boy's State on the campus last week. The session, sponsored by the American Legion and held on the O.S.C. campus for the first time, was the largest ever held in Oregon and the most successful, according to Director D. M. McDade of Portland.

Tom Spindle of Portland was elected governor of the Boys' State in a spirited campaign in which his friends advanced him as a write-in candidate in opposition to Neil C. Allan of Grants Pass and Cato Wray of Medford, the two regular party nominees. The boys spent the first four days of the week organizing into "cities," "counties," and their "state" groups with a complete set of officers for each governmental unit.

A dozen prominent civic leaders, newspapermen and public officials participated in assembly talks and classroom instruction.

Logged-off Grass Lands Shown Visitors

The sight of cattle and sheep grazing over 700 acres of excellent grass on the Northrup creek logged-off land grazing experiment greatly impressed agronomists from the western states and USDA officials from Washington, D. C., who visited the area at the conclusion of the western section agronomy meeting at Oregon State college.

Dr. O. A. Aamodt, in charge of the work with forage crops and diseases for the USDA, said the results of the Northrup creek research work may have national as well as regional significance. Other areas in this country, particularly those around the Great Lakes, are faced with a similar problem of utilizing logged-off lands during the period of reforestation or of deciding when logged-off lands are of more value for grazing than for forests. Conditions around the Great Lakes are so similar to those along the west coast that even some of the forage plant results here may be applicable there, he said.

Soil Conservation service representatives who made the tour were particularly impressed with the excellent sod cover obtained even on steep slopes, which stands up well under grazing.
