Six New Units For Western District Added by USO

SAN FRANCISCO, July 28—(Special to The American)—Six active club units were added last week to the 29 already established in the eighth region by United Service Organizations for recreation, education, spiritual and social benefit of America's defenders, according to an announcement by J. Henry Lang, USO regional director.

Returning from a conference of all regional directors in New York, Lang said that the USO was quick to prepare for service to troops in Iceland, cooperating with the Canadian War Services.

Lang reported that Harper Sibley, permanent president of the USO, has been busy since his selection a week ago, coordinating the efforts of all agencies concerned with the organization's program of welfare and speeding plans for construction of permanent clubhouses.

President Sibley also announced that to date \$9,556,000 has been officially reported as raised throughout the country and that the full \$10,765,000 asked for the soldier-sailor welfare program undoubtedly will be subscribed by the end of July.

Director Lang declared that the possibility of large additional selectee enrollments will involve increased facilities for the USO program and that national USO is definitely resolved to meet the whole new situation, which will mean expenditure of approximately \$2,000,000 above the original estimates.

The quick action in connection with the Iceland problem was cited as an example of how promptly the USO will get on the job when the signal is given.

The added USO units now active in the eighth region, composed of California, Nevada, Idaho, Washington, Oregon and Hawaii, place these units in the following areas:

CALIFORNIA: Camp San Luis Obispo, seven; Camp Roberts, six; Fort Ord-Camp McQuaide, six; San Diego, LaJolla and vicinity, four; Riverside area, two; San Francisco area, two; Vallejo-Mare Island, one; Inglewood-Burbank, one.

OREGON: Astoria, one.
WASHINGTON: Tacoma area, two; Port Townsend, one; Bremerton, one.

HAWAII: Schofield Barracks, one. United Service Organizations was incorporated, at the request of the federal government, by The Salvation Army, Y.M.C.A., National Catholic Community Service, Y.W.C.A., National Jewish Welfare Board and National Travelers' Aid Association.

The Government has appropriated and is now using \$15,000,000 to construct service clubs at 360 points throughout the United States and near overseas bases. The USO, in a campaign which is now coming to close, is raising \$10,765,000 to staff and operate the clubs.
