H. S. Showmen Win Awards at 4-H Fair

Several high school students were among those who showed livestock at the 4-H Club Fair held at Medford, September 25, 26, and 27.

Norman Smith displayed a Guernsey purebred producing cow which brought him a fourth place, and a junior heifer calf which won a second. He was also awarded the Champion Showmanship Award for pigs.

Richard Krupp displayed a junior heifer yearling which brought a third place, with his sister, Beverly Krupp, winning fifth place in the same division.

Albert Thompson won a third prize for a Guernsey purebred producing cow, a third for a junior yearling heifer, a first for one junior heifer calf, and a fourth for the other junior heifer calf.

Donald Bohnert won a fifth place award for a jersey, grade one, junior yearling heifer.

Doris Hunsley won a first in showmanship on a lamb and second on the same lamb; first on a pig and fourth in showmanship on the same pig.

Lucille Smith received an award of fourth in showmanship on sheep, third on the sheep, and fourth on a pig.

Marjorie Howsley won second on her pig and first on showmanship.

Sparky Borque Tells Of New Ice Arena

At an assembly Friday the 19th, Sparky Borque gave a talk on ice skating. Mr. Borque explained that the new ice arena is under construction in Medford and will be finished by November first. The building is to be 182 feet by 85 feet and will seat twenty-two hundred people. There will be enough freezing power produced by the Medford Ice and Storage Co. to prevent the ice from becoming wet. At one end of the building will be a coffee shop with a glass front. The coffee shop will be a few feet higher than the ice, enabling people to watch the skating. There will be locker and shower rooms and between 450 and 500 rental skates.

For the big opening night, the Follies are supposed to put on a floor show.

Mr. Borque came from Olympia and skated mostly in Seattle. He had a contract from Metro-Goldwyn Mayer in Hollywood to teach Joan Crawford how to figure skate.

Ice skating is a popular winter sport back East, but is something new to most people living in the West. The moving pictures starring Sonja Henie have greatly increased the enthusiasm for this sport in the West.

Mr. Borque showed and explained both the hockey and figure skates. All the skates for sale or rent at the arena will be high shoe skates. An ice skate, to fit correctly, must be snug but comfortable. White skates will be for women and the black for men.

Mr. Borque explained that ice skating develops an individual both physically and mentally. It helps one to gain grace and poise. This sport is not expensive and most everyone interested in learning can afford it.

The Medford ice arena will be conducted in a very clean way, and it will be safe to send children there without a guardian.
