(Continued from Last Week)

I gave each boy a stick of gum three days ago. (It is the second time we have had gum out here since arriving). To day they are still chewing that same gum. We sure laughed about it today when we came home and found them chewing away. I don't know what they will eventually do with it for they certainly never throw anything away. The new people are still pouring into this place and now we have a total of 98 men and 40 women and 5 children. The housing situation is really a problem now so they have asked that married men planning on coming to Liberia please leave their wives at home until some new houses can be erected.

Did I tell you that we went to church on Easter Sunday to the Catholic Church which was held in the small school house on the plantation. Firestone built the school house and is planning on bringing out a teacher to help educate a few native children who live within the boundaries of the plantation. While we do not understand the Catholic service very well we still enjoyed going very much. The Natives surprise you with their ability to sing. A great many of them have lovely voices and most of them are low. Of course it is only the more civilized natives who attend church and when I think of the long hours of patience the priest must have put in to train his altar boys and other assistants in putting on a service I marvel at what can be done. We do wish there was a Mission closer where we could attend but still have hopes of making a trip now and then to a Mission which can be reached by car from here.

You asked about the little white dog. Well, a girl friend out here coaxed and coaxed for him so I gave him to her and kept the little brown and white one for myself. He is real cute too. The girl friend didn't feed him very much and he was always running around to find something to eat and finally got run over. I felt badly about it for it was her fault I think. Our little pup is getting along fine and sure is frisky. He is into everything and Johnny says, "The small-dog humbug me too

much, Missey". He catches a corner of a throw rug and gives it a whirl and then looks cautiously around to see if anyone has been watching. Poor Johnny has to come "straighten it out."

Speaking of my old washman—yes he came back for his picture several months after I sacked him. I am getting to be a "Father Confessor" or something with the houseboys around here and they come tell Missey Swain their troubles and take my advice. Now they come to the office and humbly ask the messenger to go see if Missey Swain be too busy to grant them one small question. Oh, dear. Usually I make them sit and wait until I am through working for the day but that doesn't make any difference, they will wait for hours or days and never grumble. I sent one boy, Grebo to work for a white missey out here as a Steward Boy. Later he came back and wanted to quit his job but said he must come tell me first about his troubles so I would have no complaint about him for leaving his job. I told him he must return to his job and not have any more Palavers so back he went. The blacks will stay a place and work if they are told to by a white person no matter how much abuse or misunderstanding they must suffer because Grebo, for instance, felt he would be breaking faith with me because I had befriended him enough to find him a job. A month later he came and begged me so he could

please quit his job, so I told him to go and I would have no complaint. It is surely a funny psychology they have at times.
