Mrs. A. E. Lewis is visiting her son-in-law and daughter Mr. and Mrs. F. B. Jones of the Willow Springs station.

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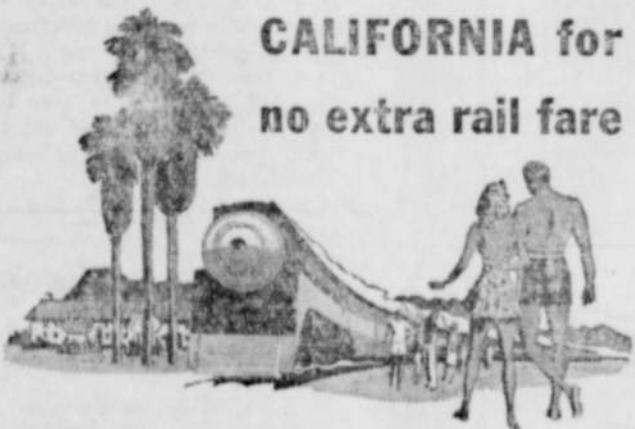
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
