Postmaster Warns Importance of Care In Package Mailing

Christmas season is now at hand and according to Postmaster Pankey all indications are that Christmas mails are going to be very heavy this year and he offers the following suggestions for mailing to senders of Christmas parcels and any other parcels which are to be mailed.

Address all mail matter plainly and completely in ink, giving street address or box or rural route number when possible.

Place sender's return address in upper left corner of the address side. Tags should not be used unless necessary as in case of suit cases or cloth bags in which case two tags on the outside should be used and a copy of the address and return card should be placed on the inside of the parcel for identification if the tag is lost.

Packing and wrapping: Pack articles carefully in strong, durable containers and wrap parcels securely and tie with strong cord but do not seal them or use gummed paper tape except when they bear a printed label or endorsement reading: "Contents Merchandise—Postmaster: This parcel may be opened for postal inspection if necessary," together with the name and address of sender. Sealed parcels not so labeled or indorsed are subject to postage at the letter rate. The name and address of the sender may be either handwritten or type written on the label.

Every one should bear in mind that if a postal clerk calls their attention to the fact that a parcel is not wrapped or tied securely enough for mailing it is not for the purpose of criticism but instead he is doing you a favor because parcels which are not securely wrapped and tied are very apt to be damaged or would reach the addressee in poor condition.

Postmaster Pankey also mentioned that special care should be taken in mailing Christmas packages and cards intended for the boys in service. If care is used in getting their address correct and plain, there will be no difficulty in the boys receiving their mail promptly. It means a great deal to the boys in camp to receive their mail.

Parcels which are wrapped with decorative (or Christmas) paper and trimming should be re-wrapped with good plain paper therefore they will also reach the addressee in much better condition.

It is an advantage to INSURE all parcels as they may be traced so that the sender may know whether or not the addressee received them in case of loss or damage collect indemnity.

"NAVY INTELLIGENCE"

When I have received a U.S. Navy rating in one field, may I change to another field?

Yes, if you are qualified. And you will not lose either your rating or your pay.

Is exercise required in the Navy?

Yes. In addition to regular training activity there is an order from the Secretary of the Navy that requires the entire personnel of the United States Navy to take thirty minutes of exercises daily.

Where is a new Navy recruit sent for his first training?

He is sent to one of four Naval Training Stations in the United States: Newport, Rhode Island; Great Lakes, Illinois; Norfolk, Virginia; or San Diego, California.

What is the next move after I have finished my training at one of the four U.S. Naval Training Stations?

After the training period is finished you go home on leave—at full pay. When I enlist in the U.S. Navy or the Naval Reserve may I do anywork in connection with aviation?

Yes, if your aptitude qualifies you, you might choose to study any one of these trades—for example, aviation machinist, aerographer, radioman, aviation metalsmith, bombsight mechanic, parachutist or aviation ordnanceman.

Is it necessary for a sailor in the United States Navy to know how to swim?

It is not necessary for an applicant to know how to swim in order to be accepted by the Navy, but every new recruit is given a swimming test at the Navy Training School. Here he must be able to swim at least fifty yards. If a man does not know how to swim he is given instruction until he can meet this requirement.
