U. S. Bank To Assist Customers In Buying Bonds

The United States National Bank, through its twenty-five units in the state, is proposing the buying of Defense Bonds on a budget basis. Folders are being issued to the bank's customers detailing three practical plans by which Defense Bonds may be acquired by easy purchase.

Plan No. 1 suggests that customers of the bank may authorize deduction from their checking accounts monthly or at other periods, these deductions to apply on the purchase of Defense Bonds. As pointed out, if a customer authorizes the bank to deduct \$6.25 per month, he will in three months have accumulated \$18.75 for the purchase of the bond costing that amount, and which at its maturity date ten years hence will have a value of \$25.00.

If he authorizes deduction of \$7.50 per month in five months it will purchase a bond costing \$37.50 which at maturity will be valued at \$50.00. If he authorizes the setting aside of \$15.00 per month, this will amount to \$75.00 in five months which will purchase a bond that will mature at \$100.00 in ten years.

Plan No. 2 proposes that if one prefers to, he can authorize his employer to withhold a specified amount or percent of his wage or salary periodically, to be applied on the purchase of Defense Bonds on the same ratio as above.

Plan No. 3 suggests as an alternative that a person adopt a self-saving method of accumulation for Defense Bonds by utilizing every spare coin or money saved by special economies, for the purchase of Defense Savings Stamps which are issued in denominations of 10c, 25c, 50c, \$1.00 and \$5.00. It is pointed out that these Savings Stamps may be exchanged for Defense Bonds when the accumulation reaches \$18.75 or multiples thereof.

According to Paul S. Dick, president of the United States National Bank, it behooves everybody to get as strongly behind the financing of the war as possible. "Defense Bonds differ very advantageously from the Liberty Loan Bonds of the former

war," said Dick, "inasmuch as they are not subject to barter, trade or sale at fluctuating prices but at all times are worth every dime the investor puts into them, plus the accumulation at various periods until maturity date. At the same time if one requires his money, the bonds will be redeemed by the United States Treasury Department at any time after sixty days from date of purchase. In these bonds we not only see a practical means of financing the needs of war but also a splendid opportunity for a person to save regularly and systematically; in short, adopting a rigid policy of thrift that will enhance his own prosperity as well as aid in the nation's protection."

America's War Victims Appeal for Your Help



First war poster of the new World War, painted by the distinguished artist James Montgomery Flagg, carries an appeal for a \$50,000,000 war fund to aid the victims of aggression upon the United States and its island possessions.

To aid the victims of warfare being waged upon America and her island possessions, the American Red Cross has issued an appeal for a \$50,000,000 war fund. Chairman Norman H. Davis announced from the national headquarters in Washington.

Mr. Davis urged men, women and children to give to this mercy fund through their local Red Cross Chapters. These funds will support the Chapter's war work with the families of men in the military services, as well as the broad relief program of the national Red Cross.

President Roosevelt, who is president of the American Red Cross, issued a proclamation urging all citizens to give to the Red Cross war fund.

In launching the appeal, Chairman Davis said:

"There are millions of our citizens who desire today to demonstrate their will to victory over the enemy. Not all can be in the armed forces, and not all can volunteer their services for humanitarian work, but all can volunteer their dollars to arm the Red Cross to be their representative at the scene of battle and distress.

"Today is the day to demonstrate our high morale, our unity, our determination not alone to support our President and our fighting men at the front, but also to insure to our wounded, homeless and suffering fellow citizens in our Pacific Islands that we stand one hundred per cent ready to aid them through the Red Cross."
